FORTY SHILLINGS FINE IN COURT

Allowed to Stand Against Man Charged With Shooting Pigeons in City.

J. W. McAuley pleaded not guilty to a charge of discharging firearms within the city limits and shooting and wounding pigeons.

Miss Catherine McLaughlin testified that she lived near the defendant, on Douglas avenue, and that she found three wounded pigeons outside her door on the afternoon of April 13. She went out to see what had happened and saw the defendant with a gun in his hand. She thought it was a .22-calibre rifle he had.

Policeman Bette told of seeing one of the birds. He went to see the defendant, who told him he had shot a couple of pigeons in the hope that the rest of them would keep away from the house, where they were becoming a nuisance.

The defendant said he came from the west, where it was allowable to shoot any birds which were on a man's premises. He had killed two, thinking this would keep the others away.

The maximum fine of forty shillings, or about \$8, was allowed to stand.
