RECORDS BROKEN AT DUAL MEET

King's Collegiate School Wins From Rothesay Collegiate by 45 to 27 Points, at Rothesay.

Five records were broken and two were equalled at the annual dual track and field meet between King's Collegiate school, Windsor, and Rothesay Collegiate school which the Windsor boys won at Rothesay yesterday afternoon by the total point score of 45 to 27. The records had been made at various times in the last eight years, during which period these inter-school meets have been held. Dunlop, of K. C. S., was the high point winner of the day with eighteen; Cameron, also of King's, was second with sixteen, and Burbridge, of Rothesay, third, with ten. Two men represented each school in each event. In the 100 yards Burbridge, after having been set back two yards, equalled the record of 11 seconds which was made in

1918. In the mile, which was one of the most exciting and uncertain races of the day, Colter equalled Gorou's record of 5 min. 5 sec., also made in 1918. In winning the 220 yards in 24 1-5 sec., Burbridge clipped a second off Flewelling's record made in 1918. In the hammer throw Dunlop, of K. C. S., set a new mark of 11 feet, the previous record being 10 ft. 5 in., made by Grosse in 1920. Cameron, of K. C. S., in the broad jump, added half an inch to the previous mark of 19 ft. 6 in., made by McCoy in 1921. Cameron also clipped a fifth of a second off Crease's hurdle mark of 1919 by doing the distance in 17 4-8. In the high jump Jake-man, of K. C. S., jumped 4 ft. 11 in., bettering McCoy's mark of 1921 by one inch.

The shot put, for which Flewelling set a mark of 36 ft. 1 1/2 in. in 1918, and the 440 yards, for which Crease holds the record of 56 seconds made in 1920, were the only two marks that were not either broken or equalled. The wet weather of yesterday caused the track to be in only fair condition. There was keen competition throughout the events which were witnessed by a good-sized crowd, including several from the city. Mr. Timothy, sports instructor at K. C. S., accompanied the athletes from Windsor. Mr. Timothy is a football and cricket player of note and is mentioned as a possibility for an all-Canadian cricket team. By winning yesterday's meet, K. C. S. will retain for a year the cup emblematic of their victory. First place counted five points, and second, three. Thirds did not count. The summary follows: 100 yards dash—1st, Burbridge, R. C.
