LANDIS FAVORS JOINT MEETING TO SETTLE BARNSTORMING RULE

New York, Aug. 2.—A joint meeting of the two major leagues may be necessary to iron out difficulties over the anti-barnstorming rule, according to Judge K. M. Landis, The National League and the American League has disagreed, it is suggested that barnstorming be allowed until Oct. 31 under certain restrictions. The situation created by these actions, Commissioner Landis said, can not be solved by correspondence, and the judge intimated that a meeting would be called in the near future. Judge Landis is not in favor of an absolute Oct. 31 restriction. He pointed out that Herbert Hunter, former big league player, is organizing an expedition to Japan after that date, and the commissioner thinks so highly of the project that he does not wish anything to stand in its way.

PLANS "AUTOMOBILE BANK"

Chicago Broker Will Make Loans on Cars in Storage Building.

Chicago, Aug. 2.—A \$500,000 automobile bank and warehouse, an institution unique in Chicago motor circles, will be the first of big building projects predicted for the South Central District. If an injunction against the property, brought for alleged violation of the Volstead act, can be dissolved work will be started within a month by Joseph Glazer, automobile dealer and investment broker.

Mr. Glazer plans to erect a sixteen-story building, the ground floor to be used for his automobile banking business, the upper floors for the storage of new automobiles by firms along automobile "row." Dealers and manufacturers can store their cars here and borrow money from Mr. Glazer on warehouse certificates.
