BLIND HERO FOILS FATHER OF BRIDE

Succeeds, Through Ruse, in
Bringing Her to America,
Despite Opposition—Stab-
bed on Wedding Night.

(New York Times.)
Salvatore Filippo, a blinded hero of the Argonne, landed in New York yesterday from the Cosulich Line steamship Argentina, bringing with him from Italy his seventeen-year-old bride, Isabella Bruna, dark-eyed and of unusual beauty.

Filippo, who is twenty-seven years old, came to America fourteen years ago, and lived for a while in Manhattan. When the war began he enlisted in the 10th Infantry, Twenty-eighth division, as sergeant major, he went into the Argonne drive. When four of his men were lying wounded, exposed to the German fire, he crept out and brought one back. Then he crept out again. Three machine gun bullets went through his head and left him blind for life.

After lying four months in the hospital, first in France and then in Baltimore, he was finally permitted to go to his home in Erie, Pa. His mother decided that she wanted to return to her home in Italy, and her blind son went with her. In an Italian village he became acquainted with Isabella Bruna. He could not see her face, but fell in love with her. He had a disability pension from the United States government amounting to \$157 a month. This gave him a position of affluence in Italy. He wooed Isabella with many gifts.

Isabella's father resented the attentions of the blind man. He knocked Filippo down one night when the young man came wooing. "Keep away from my daughter or I'll kill you," was his stern ultimatum. Disregarding his threat, Filippo continued his love-making clandestinely, and at last there was a secret wedding at his mother's house. The night of the marriage, the father, with some of his friends belonging to a sinister secret society, broke into the bridal chamber. They stabbed Filippo twice in the back and once in the arm, leaving him for dead. When he recovered consciousness his wife was gone.

While he was in the hospital his mother found the girl's hiding place and discovered that the father had succeeded in turning her affections from her young husband. Though they lived apart, they kept up secret communication.

When Filippo announced that he was coming to America his bride refused to accompany him. She went to the Argentina to see him off. The ship, he said, was to sail at four, but it started at two. When the ship was out on the Atlantic, Filippo produced a ticket and passport for his bride. She would not speak to him for three days, but at last she came back.

Customs officials, acting on Filippo's pleas, searched the pier at Brooklyn just before the Argentina's landing, to

HOW SON OF JUDGE ANGLIN MET DEATH

The Ottawa Journal says—

"Francis Warren Anglin, eldest son of Mr. Justice and Mrs. Anglin, who was seriously injured in an automobile accident on the Gatineau road on Tuesday evening, succumbed to his injuries in Water Street Hospital late last night. Throughout yesterday, little hope was entertained by those in attendance for his recovery. In the evening, he took a decided change for the worse.

"Mr. Anglin was injured when the automobile in which he was driving with George Graves of Ottawa, left the Gatineau road, two miles north of Kirk's Ferry, on Tuesday evening. The car ran into the ditch beside the road and crashed into the fence. Mr. Anglin and Mr. Graves were thrown clear of the car, which turned over twice before stopping. While Mr. Graves suffered only a cut wrist, Mr. Anglin suffered two fractured ribs as well as a fractured collar bone.

"Mr. Anglin, who was twenty-one years old, had just completed his Arts course at St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N. S., and was about to take up the study of law. He had been absent from the city for some time owing

to this studies elsewhere, but was very well known and popular in Ottawa. During the war he served with the Royal Naval Air Service and soon after the armistice met with an accident while flying. He was for some time temporarily employed with the Canadian Air Board.

"Mr. Anglin was a young man who showed much promise and ability in the profession, which his father had chosen, and which he had chosen to follow. The deep sympathy and sincere regret of the community goes out to his bereaved family. News of his sad death comes as a great shock to a host of the younger Ottawa set, whose friendship he enjoyed, especially in view of the tragic circumstances of his end.

"Besides his parents, he is survived by three sisters, Mrs. C. A. Gray, Mrs. S. V. Patterson and Miss Beatrice Anglin, also one brother, Edward, all of Ottawa."

The young man was a grandson of Hon. T. W. Anglin, for a long time a resident of St. John, in Waterloo street. Margaret Anglin, celebrated actress, is his aunt.

PRESIDENT SEES NEW HOPE RISING

Speaking at the tertiary celebration of the landing of the Pilgrims, President Harding declared his hope that the principles of toleration and liberty for which the Pilgrim Fathers crossed the Atlantic might soon awake a new world era in which peace and understanding would be assured among nations.

"A new hope looms today," said the president. "We are slowly but surely recovering from the wastes and sorrows and utter disarrangements of a cataclysmic war. Peace is bringing its new assurance, and a new realization and insistent conscience will preserve that peace. Our faith is firmer than ever, and our determination to carry out our burdening armaments may be largely diminished, and these, too, without surrender of the nationality which has inspired or the good conscience which has defended."

"The international prospect is more than promising and the distress and depression at home are symptomatic of early recovery. Solvent, financially, sound economically, unrivalled in genius, unexcelled in industry, resolute in determination and unwavering in faith these United States will carry on."

MONCTON GIRL GIVEN HEARING

Moncton, Aug. 1.—The taking of evidence in the case of Louis Cheek, charged with infanticide, was begun in the police court here today. Francis P. Murphy appeared for the prosecution and James C. Sherrin for the defence. The mother of the young woman was the first witness.

AIRMAN KILLED

Calgary, Alta., Aug. 1.—Capt. W. P. Shields, acting sub-station superintendent of the Dominion air patrol of High River (Alta.), was almost instantly killed today when, through some cause yet unknown, his machine side-slipped and fell a distance of fifty feet, alighting on one of the wings.

LORD REAY DEAD

Edinburgh, Aug. 1.—The death of Lord Reay (Donald James Mackay) was announced here today. He was in his eighty-second year. Lord Reay, who was a former governor of Bombay and one-time under secretary for India, was first president of the British Academy from 1901 to 1907. He was chief of Clan Mackay.

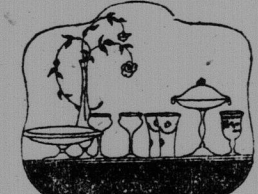

CITIZENS REJECT COMMISSION ACT

Only 3,569 of 18,000 Electors
Cast Ballots—The Majority
Against the Act is 785.

By a vote of 2,177 to 1,892 the electors of St. John yesterday rejected the majority ballot commission act. The majority of the voters who showed by their ballots that they did not consider this act of the voters good enough was 785. In other words the vote against the act was about three to two. H. E. Wardrop, the common clerk, said last night that about 18,000 were eligible to vote yesterday, but only 3,569 made use of their privilege. This fact was a matter of disappointment to many thoughtful citizens, that in a matter of such prime importance to the welfare of St. John so few citizens went to the polls.

BIG MEN FOR N. S. MEETINGS

Tour of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal Leader, in September.

(Halifax Recorder.)

During September Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King will address meetings at Windsor, Sydney, New Glasgow, Annapolis, Bridgewater and possibly Kentville. Mr. King will be accompanied on his tour by Hon. Henri Beland, M. P., ex-postmaster general in the Laurier cabinet and who was a prisoner in Germany during the late war. F. Pardee, M. P., Sarnia, Ont., chief whip of the late Laurier administration, will be one of the chief speakers.

It is expected that Ernest La Pointe, M. P., or the Hon. Rudolph Lemieux, M. P., ex-minister of marine and fisheries, will also be present. Hon. D. D. McKenzie, M. P., for Cape Breton North and Victoria, and Wm. Duff, M. P., for Lunenburg, will attend the meetings.

It is hoped that E. M. MacDonald, ex-M. P., for Pictou, who is at present ill, will have recovered sufficiently to be in attendance.

Hon. W. S. Fielding has also accepted an invitation to be present at several of the meetings.

PAPAL NUNCIO REACHES PARIS

Marks Formal Resumption of
Diplomatic Relations Between
Vatican and France.

Paris, Aug. 2.—Resumption of diplomatic relations between France and the Vatican have been formally effected by the arrival in this city from Rome, of Archbishop Cerretti, who will act as papal nuncio here.

This morning's newspapers emphasized the importance of his coming to Paris, and devoted considerable space to the government's recognition of the Holy See.

Diplomatic relations between France and the Holy See were interrupted in 1904 as a result of a controversy between the Vatican and the French government which began in 1901. The trouble arose when the French chamber

of deputies passed a bill to limit the powers of religious associations in France, despite the protest of Pope Leo XIII. In 1902 the dispute became so violent that France recalled from Rome her ambassador at the Vatican, and Pope Leo retaliated by directing the papal nuncio at Paris to request the resignations of two French bishops who were supporting the government. This action was taken by the nuncio without transmitting the order through the foreign office, as was required by the concordat between the Holy See and France, and led to the final break.

Since 1901 France has been unofficially represented at the Vatican.

OUT OF WORK, MANY SEEK SHELTER IN THE MEURLING REFUGE IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Aug. 2.—Two hundred each night was the average number of men accommodated in the Meurling Refuge here during the last month, as against an average of fourteen in July of last year. The highest point was reached last Sunday, when 242 men asked for free lodging. This constitutes the highest number in any summer month since the refuge was opened in 1914. Lack of employment is the general reason given by those seeking shelter. In winter the average number is said to be 300 daily.

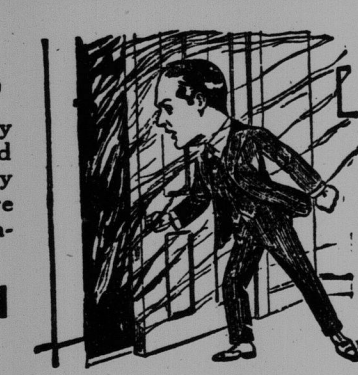

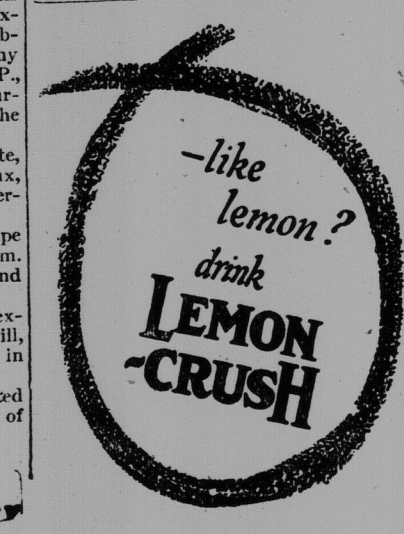
