AMERICANS CUTTING FORESTS PLANTED BY NAPOLEON I.

(New York Herald.)

With the American Army in France, May 2—The trips of prominent Ameri- cans along the lines of communications and also to the American sectors are opening new eyes to the magnitude of the work already done by America. Gi- gantic railroad systems are nearing com- pletion, linking the seacoast with the American front.

Amusing and various are the stories from the American troops regarding the number of American troops in France ready to fight. The estimates of these amateur sources range from fifty to five hundred thousand. Those who know of course refuse to tell, but it is perfectly safe to say to the American reader that the travelers from home marvel at what they see. No one ex- cept Uncle Sam put a million men in the front line this summer, but the

number already there and the activity everywhere in France with the huge ma- chine which America already has got into operation spell gloom for the Hun.

From statements made to me by pris- oners recently captured these facts are realized fully by the Germans, who are losing heart.

The attitude of the French is the warm- est possible. If there ever was any other feeling it has entirely gone since the peo- ple realize that America offers everything to General Foch and is ready to give its best and all to the cause of the Allies. In a trip through more than a hundred vil- lages I saw the children stand at atten- tion as the Americans pass, salute and shout "Vive American!"

The jubilation of the French since they have begun everywhere to see American soldiers and also to know that they are in the big battle line is remarkable, but not excelling the jubilation of the Ameri- can travelers when they see the marvels already achieved by Uncle Sam.

Just as an instance, many thousands of Americans are engaged in forestry in France, cutting, hauling, and so forth. Singularly enough, the best timber in coming from forests planted by Napo- leon.

The engineers are driving double track railroads through the forests, swamps and fields so fast as to amaze every one. The hugeness of the preparation, coupled with the accomplishments to date, provide splendid stories for American travelers to take back.

I saw Judge Wahdams, of New York, today. He has inspected the various fronts to the south of what he saw. He was the first civilian caller in Rhine- land after the big shelling, was under fire and saw the state of gas, too. He was accompanied by Hamilton Holt, and both were enthusiastic over what they saw.

"America has done wonders," Judge Wahdams said. "The people at home can be proud of what we see. I have a little realization of the stupendousness of the under- taking and the achievement and am satis- fied we have an important part in the decisive battles before long. Any one criticizing America's war work shows utter ignorance of things here."

"The spirit of the soldiers is magnifi- cent. All want to fight and all are wel- coming any suggestion that more troops be despatched to Picardy. Despite all that it has done, America must keep pouring men here, for the quicker they arrive the quicker will be the end of the war, every one realizes."

What It Means. (Montreal Gazette.)

Many people, who read of the ruthless doings of the Hun, are unwilling to ad- mit to themselves that there could be possibility of such things occurring to them and those they love. It is all so distant and nebulous, and unthinkable. Moreover, we are sure that the horrors are real, and not the effort of a lurid imagination? Is this not the twentieth century? Have we not schools and churches and the noblest expressions of the human intellect in art and painting and divine poetry, which refine and spiri- tualize the mind?

We might, academically, discuss the question of the Germans coming to Canada, but we do not entertain the idea for a moment. We are secure. Our lives are regular and normal. We do not visualize the situation, as it might be applied to ourselves. Let Germany take the Channel ports; let the British fleet be destroyed; and the Hun would instantly essay the mastery of this hemisphere.
