FORTUNE FOR AN AGED NURSE

Mrs. Russell Did Duty in Three Wars JUST FOUND BY DETECTIVE

Had Fled From Home in Scotland—Was Nurse in War of Greece and Turkey, in Boxer Trouble and Spanish War

Atlantic City, N. J., Feb. 7.—Following a queer provision of her father's will, a detective in the employ of a firm of British solicitors found here this week, Mrs. Helaine Russell, who has served as a nurse of the Red Cross Society in three wars and as a result the venerable woman expects to inherit \$30,000 to make her last days more than comfortable.

There had been an estrangement between herself and her entire family since the age of twelve years, she ran away from her home in Scotland inspired with the motive of becoming a nurse. She found women who encouraged her design and she was entered for training at the Swiss Red Cross Hospital at Geneva. For a long time her family was unable to trace her and when at last she had been found her old Scotch father resented her having left his home without permission and later disapproved of the marriage she had made. But some time prior to his death forty years ago, he made a secret investment of several thousands of dollars in British Columbia iron and coal stocks which have grown largely in value, so that the original investment sums up to \$30,000.

In a codicil of his will her parent provided that this money was to be kept in trust for his absent daughter, but that the legacy was on no condition to be paid to her unless she should confront poverty. Following instructions passed on to them from their predecessors, the British law firm has kept Mrs. Russell more or less under their observation.

It was an eventful life that the solicitors had to follow. At seventeen she met W. G. Russell, a young artist, who afterward acquired considerable distinction. Afterward she got in touch with her parents, but in the course of the fashion way they were scandalized by the manner of her leaving home and of marrying at such an early age. She received word word that her father had been to Cuba and acted as nurse for the patriots of the revolution in their rude camps and later in the trenches. After the death of the artist Mrs. Russell's career as nurse really began. She saw service in the Turco-Greek war, the Red Cross nurse, and later in the Boer uprising in China. Awards she came to Atlantic City with her two daughters. Red Cross nurse—American war occurred she offered to enlist, but the age regulations barred her. She had been to Cuba and acted as nurse for the patriots of the revolution in their rude camps and later in the trenches.

She was welcomed in Cuba by commanders who knew her of old and she served with the native army till the end of the war. When she came to Atlantic City, which she has since made her home. It is understood the detective found her and her daughters not in dire need, but in such circumstances as warranted him in reporting that the time of paying over her father's secret legacy had come.

AGED Mrs. Russell willingly showed a letter from Clara Barton, president of the International Red Cross Society, and other credentials of her career. She also refused to discuss the details of her life. She feared certain relatives in Scotland who had never forgiven her might undertake to tie up the legacy with the rest of the British chancery courts.

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Daily Hints For the Cook

ARMY SARDINE SANDWICH Remove bones and skin from one box of sardines, add one teaspoon olive oil, 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice, same of grated onion or few drops onion juice, Worcester sauce, salt. Mix well. Use on buttered bread.

PEACH POPOVERS Make a batter with 2 cups of flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 well-beaten eggs, and enough milk to make it just stiff enough to drop from a spoon. Butter deep iron gem pans and have them sizzling hot. Put a spoonful of butter in each, then a layer of thinly sliced peaches and some more of the batter. Bake in a quick oven and serve at once.

THE BOARD OF TRADE

At a meeting of the council of the board of trade yesterday afternoon Percy W. Thomson, A. E. Massey and J. M. Robinson were appointed a committee to consider the applications for the position of secretary and publicity commissioner for the board of trade. The committee has authority to correspond with any of the applicants with a view of engaging one of them.

A resolution passed by the Campbellton board of trade in opposition to the idea of the Intercolonial Railway being turned over to a private corporation was endorsed by the council.

A. M. Boulton, chief engineer of the eastern division of the G. T. P., was in the ranks by which the Grand Trunk shall approach and enter the city. Mr. Boulton spoke of the Grand Trunk Pacific in regard to terminals here. The conference was private and members of the council would not discuss the matter after the meeting.

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Women's Canadian Club The fourth annual report of the Women's Canadian Club of St. John is a much larger and more ambitious publication than that of the men's club. It contains the annual address of the president, secretary and treasurer, the constitution of the club and a list of the names of the members, which at the time of the report numbered about 430, but has since been considerably enlarged. The president, Mrs. E. A. Smith, in her address gives a very interesting review of the address delivered before the club during the year, and not the least interesting portion are the comments which the president makes upon these addresses and the subjects which they treat. The club had at the close of the year a balance on hand of \$450.49. One of the activities of the club was the creation of a welcome sign at West St. John for immigrants, and the next important project is the erection of a memorial to Lady LaTour.

AT LYONS The Lyric Theatre held capacity audiences at both performances. As usual the house was warm and cozy and quite comfortable as a seat before the fire at home. The programme of yesterday was an excellent one. The vanderbilt especially was greatly enjoyed, this being due to the efforts of two clever juvenile performers, The Haskell Children, who hail from the city of Boston, and Bob L. Post, James Hays, S. C. Beam and Charles W. Wainwright and others. The singing and dancing was executed in a manner that showed a careful training and much ability. There was some speculation among last night's audiences as to whether the act consisted of a boy and a girl or if it was two clever girls of fifteen years but the impression of the boy is so well done that it is quite difficult to tell the difference. On Saturday the children will hold a special matinee for the benefit of the school children.

Scott and Henry Miles, waited on Commissioner Agar yesterday afternoon to protest against the property owners being charged with any street improvements. A petition to the same effect was presented but as the signers had not specified the amount of street frontage they owned, the petition was returned to have this information added and will be submitted later. No action will be taken by the commissioners until both sides are heard on the subject.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES Leman Hatton, a prominent real estate dealer of Saskatoon, was found guilty yesterday of obtaining money under false pretences. He had sold a piece of property, belonging to a Detroit man, to Police Sergeant Quinn and was unable to deliver a title when the last payment was made.

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


