



Near the head of North wharf in the building seen there, was a drug store successfully conducted by "Tom." M. Reid, who was in fater years mayor of the city. Nearby was a hardware establishment owned by J. N. C. Black.




River Navigation Scheme—A Letter From Hon. Mr. Pugsley


