Wm. Turner, the murderer of little Barbara Waterhouse, was hanged at Leeds, Eng., Tuesday. Turner protested his innocence to the last.

Judge Harford, of the United States district court, Seattle, Wash., interpreting the Exclusion act, has decided that all Chinese who come to that country via British Columbia in violation of law must be sent back to British Columbia and not to China.

Frank C. Almy, murderer of Christie Warden, was found in Warden's barn, Hanover, N. H., Thursday morning. The barn was set on fire. Almy fled 15 shots at the searcher and killed one named Arno Turner. Whether he was shot or perished in the flames is not known.

A five-story tenement on Chryste street, New York, was burned at 1.15 Wednesday morning. Eighteen families were asleep in the house at the time, but all escaped with their lives, though several were seriously injured. The fire is supposed to have been of incendiary origin.

The record in somnambulistic feats has been broken by Henry Lynn, a Liverpool, Iowa, farmer. Mr. Lynn arose in a somnambulic trance at an early hour in the morning and walked eighteen miles before he awoke. It was nearly noon when the sleeper came to himself and found that he was plodding along the highway near Algona.

Considerable excitement was created in Ireland Sunday by the sudden death of Canon Carlton while preaching in Killybeggy Cathedral. The Rev. gentleman had progressed to some extent with his sermon when he was suddenly overcome and fell. A number of the congregation were present, and it is not known how long he lay before he died.

The launching of the armored battle ship "Columbia" at the navy yard at Groton, Conn., is being celebrated in Italy's navy. It is being given shorter than the "Sardaigna," launched last year in Spain and said to be the biggest ship in the world, and is also the most exact counter-part of the "Umberto," launched in Naples three years ago.

The "Columbia" carries an armor fourteen inches thick and has forty-eight great guns. The speed of the new battle ship is eighteen knots. It has cost more than \$5,000,000, has been building last week, has returned home, and is being prepared for action before the summer of 1894.

CHICAGO'S BABY SMOKER.

The Parents of a Little Victim of Tobacco To Be Prosecuted.

At Chicago the Illinois Humane Society has decided to prosecute the parents of Leonard Turner, aged two years, who, it is alleged, was taught by his father to smoke, beginning when the child was two months old. The mother of late has been leaving the little boy at a nursery. The matron of the nursery refused to allow the use of tobacco and reported the case. The Humane Society took the matter up, and two physicians examined the child.

He was found to be in a very feeble condition, already suffering from acute nicotine poisoning and having what is known as the "tobacco heart." His skin, eyes and brain are also affected. He displays but little intelligence now, and brightens up only when his pipe is placed before his eyes. Doctors express doubts as to whether the child can live long.

Got a Shock.

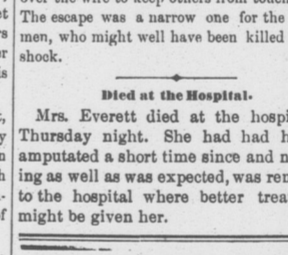
While some workmen were engaged Thursday in the erection of a new building on Notre Dame street, Montreal, they happened to swing the boom of the crane against an alternating wire, as it is called, of the local Electric Company. The end of the boom was iron and the wire rope attached to it formed a conductor for the electricity. A workman who was at the crank of the crane, was instantly struck and in a moment his arm was paralyzed. Another workman, who had hold of the wire rope which ran down to the street, received a severe shock, and a fellow-workman came to his assistance and took hold of him, likewise received a shock. He was knocked into the street and did not recover his normal condition of some time. Luckily neither of the men had the fatal, burned of their hands, which would have been the case had the current been stronger. It was some time before the current was turned off, and in the meantime a policeman had to stand guard over the wire to keep others from touching it. The escape was a narrow one for the workmen, who might well have been killed by the shock.
