MONTREAL FLOUR MARKET. (Trade Bulletin.)

The market has shown no improvement during the past week, and values are as unsettled as ever. Sales of best crands of strong bakers' have taken place at \$3.421-2 to 3.45, while less desirable grades have sold all the way from \$3.25 to 3.35. A lot of Manitoba patents was placed at \$3.70 for maritime provinces account, and two other parcels sold at \$3.67 1-2 and \$3.70 respectively. 'These figures show a decline of 5c from last week's actual sales. In straight rollers there has been further business at \$3.40 to 3.50 on track here in car lots, with a sale of a car lot reported at \$3.30, but this was said to be ground from a mixture of northern and winter wheat. Sales of smaller quantities were also made ex store at \$3.55 to 3.60.

THE EXPORT EGG TRADE. Some heavy transactions in pickled eggs have been made by Montreal firms for English account at 6s 3d to 6s 9d per long hundred (10 dozen) c i f for November-December delivery. Montreal pickled eggs are well liked in the Liverpool and Glasgow markets, and a greater demand for Canadian limed stock is experienced every year. Although a few lots of fresh eggs have gone forward to the English market, it was found too early to be profitable, and it may be some weeks yet before prices on the other side will warrant more extensive shipments from Canada

Prof. Duff of Perdu university, La. Fayette, Indiana, arrived in the city on Saturday and went through to Fredericton. Speaking of the silver ques-tion, Prof. Duff said to the Sun that the question was taken far more seriously in the United States than any ordinary party issue. The people are almost frantically in cornest, and wherever one meets groups of men, in restaurants, in hotels or other public places the respective merits of gold and silver standards are argued with a fierceness that generally develops into angry dispute. What effect the agitation for free silver will have on the federal elections is entirely beyond mothing by which it can be gauged.
