STRIKERS MUST VACATE COMPANY'S HOUSES TODAY

**Dominion Coal Company to
Serve Orders for Ejectment
Without Further Delay**

SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 12.—Several hundred eviction notices will be served on the striking tenants of the Dominion Coal Company tomorrow. The company for some time has been preparing for this step and tomorrow the men whom the company consider as strikers will all be served with notices to quit their houses. This does not mean all the men who have remained away from work, for many of them would have come back to their places were now, the company say, but for the fear of intimidation. But all of the men who have taken an active part in the movement and are tenants of

the company will be put to look for other quarters soon. The legal staff of the company has been working strenuously for some time preparing these notices, and they will be served by the company's police force tomorrow. The first of the evictions will likely be made tomorrow. Orders of ejectment in three of the twenty-eight cases were signed by Judge Finlayson some days ago, but a furious rain storm has prevailed here for several days and the company were loath to turn any one out in the streets in such weather. The U. M. W. is reported to have a lot of houses rented and will be able to take care of all the persons rendered homeless.

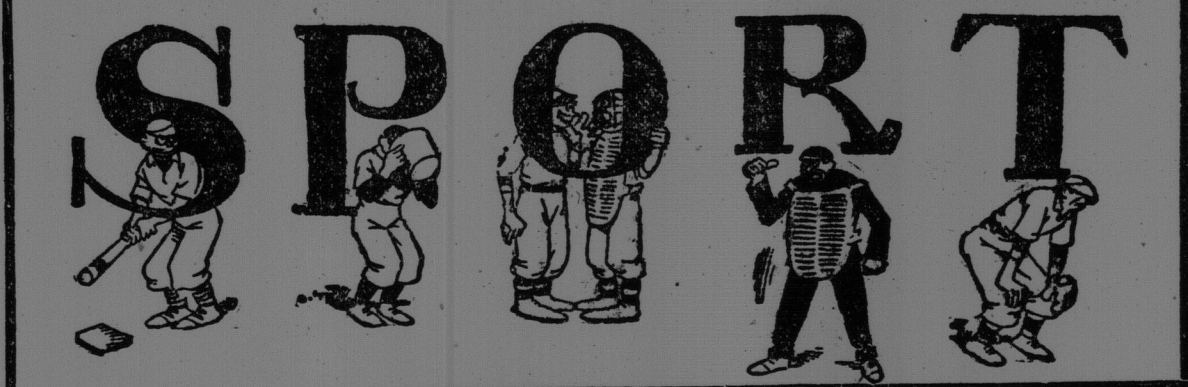

YACHTS HAVING GAY TIME AT PORTLAND

Races and Receptions—32 of the Original Squadron of 50 in Port.

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Thirty-two of the New York Yacht Club sailing squadron of fifty vessels had arrived here at dark tonight and were in readiness to proceed tomorrow on the run to Rockland. There were in the harbor ten of the twenty-two sailing craft which raced out of Vineyard Haven Tuesday morning and their owners were eager for tomorrow's 62.3 miles from Rockland to Monks Island buoy. Commodore Arthur C. James was of the opinion that the absent craft would pass this port and keep on to Rockland although a few stragglers probably would come in during the night. The wind was a "smoky so" wester.

The sailing craft here were the Elmira, Aurora, Intrepid, Vigilant, Sea Fox, Winsome, Istaleen, Tornaria, Iroquois and Shepherds. The steam yachts arriving today were the Hauoli, Cynthia, The Limited, Mahard, Vergna, and Privateer. The steam yachts Carmala and Christina steamed to Rockland today. The schooner yacht Genesee and the steam yacht Wavika also arrived at Rockland this afternoon.

The races for the Owl and Gamecock colors and motor launches were held this afternoon. The Gamecock races for crews of five men in glee was won by a crew from the Elmira. Three men from the Tornaria won the Owl race, while a sailor from the Aurora was the winner of the Dinghy race. Three of the five entries of the motor launches, the boat from Commodore James' yacht Alaba being victorious. A reception was tendered on board the commodore's yacht at 4 o'clock at which there were present 24 captains and nearly 300 guests.

BIG CROWD WATCHES WOONSOCKET RACES

WOONSOCKET, R. I., Aug. 12.—The best racing of the week was witnessed at the harness meeting on the Woonsocket half mile track by the record crowd of the meet, over 2,000 persons. Ralph Wick was the only favorite to win. In four heats Shopteller won the 224 trot, Bronson, the favorite, setting fifth place. Frank A. captured the 217 paces in straight heats. Drivers Ford, Holtenbee and Fleming were fined \$25 apiece for scoring ahead of the pole horses in the first heat of 217 paces and all three were compelled to pay their fines before the race was started.

AMHERST MAN BREAKS RECORD

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Aug. 12.—Tonight at the electric light show on the C. A. A. grounds two thousand people saw Cameron of Amherst, the long distance runner of the Maritimes, win the ten mile race in 56:04.5, establishing a new maritime record, defeating Rogers of Halifax, second man, by two yards, and Michael Paul, third man, P. E. Island Longboat, by fifty. Other starters were Campbell, (Glen Bay), Harcourt, Robinson, Howatt, Charlottetown. For the first five miles Campbell, Rogers, Paul and Harley kept together, the others being left behind early in the race and eventually lapped twice.

PARLIAMENT TO MEET

NOV. 4; HEAVY PROGRAM
Canada's Naval Defense Plan Chief Topic of Discourse

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 12.—If the present expectation of the government is realized parliament will be called to meet on Thursday, November 4. It is possible that unforeseen contingencies may delay the opening until a week or even two weeks later, but the event is bound to occur by November 18. The estimates are being prepared by the departments so they may be ready for November fourth. The insurance bill is ready to be put before parliament again. It has been considered for several sessions and last year was advanced through the commons, but did not reach the senate in time to become law. It will be put through this year. An amendment to the bank act will probably figure on the autumn programme.
The speech from the throne will contain an announcement that Canada's share in naval defense. The precise terms of the announcement will not be determined until the government is able to consider the report which Sir Frederick Borden and Hon. Mr. Brodeur make of the work of the imperial defence conference which is now being held in London. The new Franco-Canadian treaty will form an item in the speech from the throne, and the bill ratifying it is likely to be put through before the Christmas holidays are reached.
It is probable that the opposition will be more aggressive than last session, but with a substantial amount of progress with legislation before Christmas prorogation should take place at a reasonably early date in the programme.
