EDITORIAL

More Co-operation Should Exist in N.B.

An editorial which appeared recently in the columns of The New-castle Advocate contains advice and suggestions which may well be heeded by the various Boards of Trade and Municipal Bodies in New Brunswick. They are also applicable to individuals and if they are followed by individuals as such the endorsement of the organizations which are trying to relieve the unemployment situation will not be destructively criticized. Such criticism is usually a waste of good energy which might, at this time particularly, be devoted to sound thought and constructive criticism. The editorial is as follows:

"Every county, city and town in New Brunswick has problems of unemployment and each section works along lines concerning its own particular problem, thinking no doubt, that when that particular problem is solved, there is nothing more to be done. This method of individual work is not good. There are consequently much overlapping of effort, expense and particularly unnecessary wastage of energy with inevitable disappointment in the end. "The municipalities of the northern part of the province have problems indigenous to them, and each of our northern localities have been endeavoring to solve these in its own way.

"The important thing, that we have not been realizing, is that what benefits one part of the province, benefits the province as a whole. "That is what the people of this province must take into account today, irrespective of locality. "When our part of the province is not prosperous, the people of the southern part feel the adverse effects. The same applies if conditions are reversed. "The Saint John Board of Trade has assisted, and at present is helping to solve certain economic problems pertaining to the Miramichi district. That is good. "Today, Saint John has a problem on its hands which eventually may affect a large part of our province. That is bad. "At this period of industrial readjustment, New Brunswick should act as one indivisible unit. "There should be a New Brunswick Board of Trade to handle New Brunswick's problems. "If this is not expedient enough, then there should be a Union of New Brunswick Boards of Trade. "Whichever method is used, it need not interfere with the Maritime Board of Trade. In any event, there must be absolute unanimity of opinion throughout the province to accomplish anything worth while. "The stronger Boards of the southern part of the province will then support the appeals of the northern Boards can show to those outside the province, that when the southern part demands its rights, the province as a whole is behind that demand. "The motto: 'Ech for All and All for Ech,' should be exemplified right now."

A WORKMAN ELECTROCUTED AT GREEN RIVER

An unfortunate accident occurred near the Town power house at Green River on Monday afternoon when Andy Burso, a Ukrainian, was electrocuted. Some changes were being made in the wiring and live wires were exposed, but were protected by a temporary enclosure and notices were posted on it. Burso dropped an oil can in the enclosure and crawled under the fence to get it. As he was crawling back his head touched one of the wires which was charged with 15,000 volts and he was electrocuted immediately. Dr. Martin was called, but he was unable to revive the unfortunate man by resuscitation. Coroner Letourneau visited the scene and gave permission to remove the body which was taken to Boucher's undertaking rooms. A son of the deceased arrived from Montreal at noon on Wednesday and made arrangements for burial. Mr. Burso's address in given as 2049 Clark Street, Montreal and it is reported that he leaves to mourn a wife and two or three children.

SENTENCED FOR COMMON ASSAULT IN COUNTY COURT

The November sitting of the Madawaska County Court with Hon. J. L. Carleton presiding, was held here on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The Grand Jury consisting of Denis Nadeau, Foreman, George Thibodeau, Fred Senechal, Maxime Guérette, F. X. Cyr, Fred E. Desjardins, Maxime Moreau, Charles Dubé and Xavier Moreau considered two criminal indictments and found no bill against Willie Montreuil who was charged with arson and a true bill against Remi and Francis Violette who were charged with assaulting J. P. Soucy at the Parish of St. Leonard on the third day of October. The case against the Violette was proceeded with Tuesday afternoon. Mr. A. J. Dionne represented the Attorney General and called three witnesses, Mr. Soucy, the informant, Dr. L. J. Violette and Miss Elizabeth Corbin. From the evidence of Mr. Soucy it appeared that he works on a farm belonging to Mr. Epiphane Nadeau, which was run by Remi Violette who was in charge of the farm of Mr. Nadeau, assisted by his brother Francis. Mrs. Remi Violette on the morning of October third had some words with Mr. Soucy regarding eggs, as a result of which Mrs. Violette shed some tears. Shortly after the accused persons first called Mr. Soucy was assaulted and hit with the assistance of Francis who came in shortly after. Mr. Soucy received two broken ribs and wounds about the head. He claimed to have been struck with a broom handle. Dr. Violette told of the broken ribs and wounds inflicted on Miss Corbin told of treating the wounds on his head with iodine. Mr. Max. D. Cormier who defended the accused persons first called Miss Anna Dubé, a maid at the Violette home, corroborated the story of Mrs. Violette. The defendants were called and although their stories did not agree exactly with that of Mrs. Violette and the effect of the evidence had not hit Soucy with anything and that he did hit his head on a shelf when he had Remi down on the table. The addresses to the jury were dispensed with. The judge in his charge to the jury instructed them that they could not find the defendants guilty unless they were satisfied to do bodily harm, but that they might find them guilty of common assault; and it was for them to decide. After being heard for several minutes they returned their verdict finding both defendants guilty of common assault. They were sentenced to three months in goal or a fine of \$25.00. The petit jury consisted of: Antoine Ringuette, Alphonse Levesque, Denis Daigle, H. P. Mulhern, Medley Rice, Frank Pigeon, Henry Fournier, Fred F. Cyr, Onésime Martin, Damase Moreau, John Rivard, Thomas Caron and Donat Cyr. Several civil cases were set over to be tried in Chambers.

HEAVY DAMAGE CAUSED BY FIRE AT MADAWASKA, Me.

Fire caused \$30,000.00 lost at Madawaska, Maine last Sunday evening, burning the three-story hotel building owned by Fortunat Pelletier to the ground and damaging the building of Antoine Soucy to a considerable extent. It is believed that the fire started by spontaneous combustion in some mops and rags in a closet on the third floor of the Pelletier building. Madawaska has no water or sewerage system of fire department, so the Edmundston fire department was asked to assist. Before its arrival, chemicals were used but without very appreciable success. The Edmundston fire fighters connected their hose with the water system maintained in the mills of the Fraser Paper Ltd. Four hoses were eventually in use. At first the pressure was not good but soon owing to the efforts of David Warren it was functioning properly, but the Pelletier building was beyond saving and the fire penetrated through the windows of the Soucy building which is brick-cased. The flames did, however, confine the fire to the third floor, but considerable water and smoke damage was done to the rest of the building and contents. A wooden building close to and on the upper side of the Pelletier building was saved. The building owned by Mr. Pelletier was conducted by him as a hotel and restaurant. P. A. Walsh also had his law office there. Mr. Soucy's building was a boarding house and restaurant. Several wardens in both buildings lost all their clothes and personal effects. Considerable damage was done to the furniture when thrown out by the flames. The Van Buren and Caribou fire departments were called and arrived at about 9 o'clock but by that time the fire was under control. It is estimated that Mr. Pelletier's loss will amount to \$20,000.00 which is partly covered by insurance and that of Mr. Soucy's \$10,000.00 covered by insurance.
