NEW BRUNSWICK SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Ninth Annual Short Course Will Open at Experimental Station at Fredericton on November 10th. — Interesting Course Outlined and Competent Staff in Charge.

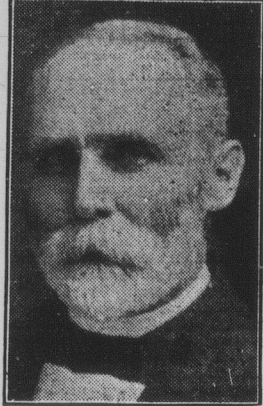
Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 7th. — The ninth annual short course offered by the New Brunswick Agricultural School to boys and young men will be held between November 10th and December 18th, according to an announcement made by Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture.

The course, which is open to boys 16 years of age and over, will include instruction in animal husbandry, veterinary science, dairying, bee-keeping, poultry, horticulture, field husbandry, and farm mechanics. O. C. Hicks, B. S. A., will be principal of the school, with a competent staff to be chosen from the Provincial Department of Agriculture and the Dominion Experimental Station at Fredericton where the school is to be held.

The entire plant of the Station will be placed at the disposal of the Agriculture School to be used as an experimental laboratory where information given at the lecture will be complemented by practical observations. Attendance will be facilitated by the low tuition fee of \$3.50 weekly which low rate is made possible by the residence dormitory located at the Experimental Station. The dormitory has a capacity of 25 and applications will be considered on a first-come-first-served basis.

Head of Big Advertising Firm in New York Says New Highway Best Travelled on 3,000 Miles Trip — Superb Scenery and Big Game Seen.

PRAISES THE NEW ROAD

Fredericton, N. B., October 6th. — An unqualified tribute to the province of New Brunswick upon the completion of the Campbellton-St. Leonard Highway is contained in an unsolicited letter from Sturges Dorrance, president of Dorrance, Sullivan & Company, New York City, advertisers, to D. Leo Dolan, Director, New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel.

Besides making very favorable comment upon the road surface itself, the letter from this satisfied New Yorker also expresses a keen appreciation of the almost untouched game country which has been made available by the opening of Highway No. 17.

A part of Mr. Dorrance's letter is reprinted below: "In nearly 3,000 miles of driving, most of it through Canada, and around the Gaspé Peninsula, we found few highways in better condition than this Route No. 17. From Campbellton to St. Leonard I clocked about 102 miles and I made the run in just two hours and fifty minutes. Any road that you can drive over on an average of 28 miles or better, in complete comfort, is a good road — and this is a splendid road."

"It is a picturesque trip also. We saw on the road, or in the woods alongside of the road, three deer at different times, one grown buck, one young buck and a doe, two red foxes and any number of smaller animals, as well as a number of porcupines that were so tame they would not even rise from the side of the road when the car passed."

GLoucester BY-ELECTION

Bathurst, 3. — The by-election in Gloucester county, to fill the vacancy in the New Brunswick Legislature caused by the death in December last of John P. Lordon, of Bathurst, a member of the Opposition, will be held on Oct. 26, with nomination day on Oct. 19. It was announced here to-day.

Supporters of the two candidates, Dr. W. H. Coffin, of Bathurst, Government, and F. T. B. Young, of Caraquet, Opposition, "have swung all districts of the country to be visited by the standard-bearers of both parties, within the next three weeks."

The writ for the by-election reached Sheriff Hector Poirier to-day.

INCREASING DEMAND FOR LOBSTER MEAT

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 7th. — A new method of shipping lobsters has been adopted this season in connection with the lobster industry at Pictou, N. S., and Cape Tormentine, N. B. Heretofore lobsters have been shipped either alive or in sealed cans. Commencing this season lobster meat is being shipped via Canadian National Express to the New York and Boston markets in unsealed cans. The meat is removed from the lobster and placed in cans which have a perforated bottom. When each can is filled, it is dipped in a pickle and then placed in a compartment in a wooden case and ice is then packed around the compartment. Each can contains approximately fourteen ounces of lobster meat and each case contains forty-eight cans. An average of from ten to fifteen cases a day is being shipped from Cape Tormentine. According to the packers, there is an increasing demand for this lobster meat in the New York and Boston markets.

MARITIME STORIES FOR SOUTH AFRICA

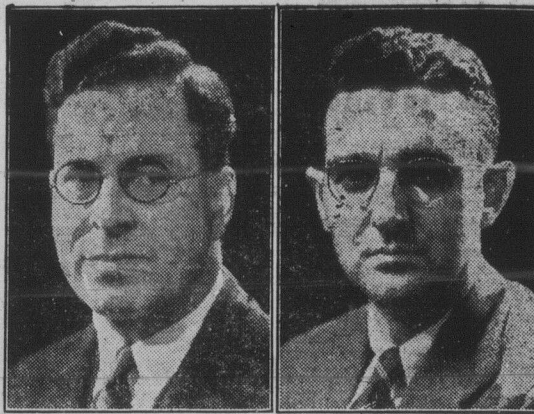

GOV. GENERAL TO FISH IN N.-B. IN 1932

Announces His Intention to Visit Province Following Presentation to His Excellency of Complimentary Fishing and Hunting License at Fredericton — Viscount Duncannon Also Coming to New Brunswick Next Year.

His Excellency, the Earl of Bessborough, Governor-General of Canada, together with his elder son Viscount Duncannon hope to fish and hunt in New Brunswick during 1932, according to official news received.

During his visit to Fredericton this week His Excellency was presented with a complimentary hun-

ting and fishing license by Hon. G.D. Richards, Premier of the Province, on behalf of the Government of New Brunswick. This complimentary license was beautifully bound in blue vellum, suitably gold lettered, the scroll work being done on white parchment. The representation was made to His Excellency by Premier Richards at the reception tendered the Governor-General in the Assembly Chamber of the Parliament Buildings at Fredericton and the Earl of Bessborough in a most happy reply intimated his intention of enjoying the angling and hunting privileges in New Brunswick during next year.

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
