TEMPERANCE PROHIBITION MEET THE GOVERNMENT

Representatives of N. B. Temperance Federation and Moral and Social Reform Council Received Sympathetic Hearing from Premier Fleming and Colleagues—Premier's Reply to Delegates Received with Enthusiasm.

At the meeting of the local government yesterday afternoon, large and influential delegations representing the New Brunswick Temperance Federation, and the Council of the Moral and Social Reform Association were present to urge the need of advanced temperance legislation. The Federation asked for the adoption of a provincial prohibition measure, a draft of which was submitted, and the delegation from the Moral and Social Reform Association asked for a large number of amendments to the liquor license act with a view to simplifying the enforcement of the law and abolishing the treating habit and other features of the liquor business which are generally considered injurious. The attitude of the government to the representation of the temperance people as evidenced by the remarks of the members attending the hearing was very sympathetic and the Premier's reply to the request for a prohibition law covering the province made a very favorable impression. He assured the delegation that the draft act presented would have the most thorough and most sympathetic consideration of the government, and that while the government might not agree on all points with them as to the methods to be adopted in dealing with the liquor traffic, it was heartily in accord with them in their desire to promote temperance and sobriety.

He rounded the delegation that the present administration had adopted amendments to the liquor laws that had resulted in a great extension of the area under prohibition, and had enabled the temperance element to greatly advance their cause; a statement that called forth the applause of many present at the hearing. Some of the spokesmen of the delegation expressed their appreciation of what the present government had done for the temperance cause, and the tenor of the remarks of all indicated great confidence in the willingness of the government to do its utmost to meet the wishes of the people. When the conference opened the government rooms were crowded with ladies and gentlemen prominent in temperance work in the city and province.

Mr. Smith Opens the Case.

J. Willard Smith, president of the Federation, opened the case for a provincial prohibition measure. He said the federation had prepared a draft act and the delegates that he had not been forwarded to the government so that the members might have had an opportunity to study it. In the last few years, he said, the question of prohibition had entered upon a practical stage. The Nova Scotia government had adopted a prohibitory law covering all the province except Halifax, and making it possible to get a license, or no license, in the near future. Most advanced countries were progressing towards prohibition. New Zealand had recently voted in favor of general prohibition. In England, the local option principle was in active operation and the number of saloons districts was being rapidly reduced. Ontario is moving along the same lines; the number of saloons in that province is today is only one-fourth of what they were in 1885.

Continuing, Mr. Smith said that he did not mean by prohibition the complete stopping of the sale of liquor. No law ever achieved its full effect. But a prohibitory measure such as was proposed would put the liquor traffic under the ban of the law, and make it possible to abolish the worst evils of the traffic. In Prince Edward Island the prohibition law had worked well. The prohibition was satisfactory to the great majority of the people. It was sometimes said, continued Mr. Smith, that public sentiment was not educated up to the point where prohibition was desirable. But the fact that there was an overwhelming sentiment in favor of prohibition in this province. When the plebiscite was taken some years ago a majority of 17,000 people voted for prohibition. Efforts to resist the adoption of the license system in Restigouche, Westmorland and Northumberland were defeated by large majorities. In St. John city there are 7 wards where licenses are not issued, the whole province being divided into 6 wards. In the whole province there are only 135 licenses. A striking evidence of the sentiment of the people is found in the fact that 274,000 people of the province are living in prohibition districts and only 56,397 in license districts.

The government was deeply interested in the question of suppressing the liquor traffic. Its revenue from the liquor business was only \$18,000 a year, but as the revenue from the province was \$1,800,000, the expenditure made necessary to keep up the provincial hospital and other institutions whose inmates were recruited from the victims of the liquor habit. This government, continued Mr. Smith, has done much to gain the confidence of the people. Its Highway policy, its immigration policy, its work in securing the construction of the Valley Railway, and its generous support to the campaign for stamping out the great white plague are appreciated by the people of St. John. But the government should begin at the right end and abolish the profit motive in the liquor business. The source of tuberculosis—the gigantic curse of the liquor traffic.

Rev. Mr. Aitkens Heard.

Rev. Mr. Aitkens, travelling secretary of the Moral and Social Reform Council of the Methodist church, who was the next speaker, said that at a recent meeting of the church authorities in the province a resolution had been adopted declaring that the government should be asked to pass a prohibitory law. He reviewed the inception of the temperance movement about 65 years ago, and said the demand for prohibitory legislation was general. The cities caused the liquor evil in the country districts, but inasmuch as the cities would sink in their own corruption if they were not supplied by new blood from the country, the people of the country had a right to take measures to prevent the city corrupting its own as well as the

country people.

Prohibition a Moral Question.
Rev. W. R. Robinson said prohibition was a moral rather than a political question—a question for the church of Christ rather than the politicians. He sketched briefly the history of the movement to secure temperance legislation, and said usually loopholes had been left in the acts, making it difficult to enforce them. He went on to find fault with the officials, saying that they were not doing their duty.

The Premier—"If any charges are made against any official of this government, those charges will be duly investigated and the officials will be removed if they have not done their duty."
Mr. Robinson said no charges had been made against the officials as yet, but they intended to make charges against Inspector Jones. He thought the enforcement of the liquor laws should be controlled by the co-operation of the temperance element. He knew the government was quick to enforce the game and other laws, but the officials were not enforcing the Scott Act in Fredericton for instance. The Provincial Secretary—"The government does not have anything to do with the enforcement of the Scott Act. The city council is the controlling factor in temperance council may be elected, and the Scott Act rigidly enforced, but usually in a short time it is turned out and the law is ignored."

Mr. Robinson said he recognized that the government was not responsible for what it was not responsible. He was of the opinion that the present situation showed the need of provincial prohibition. A centralized authority was needed to enforce temperance laws.

Represented 90,000 Baptists.

Rev. David Hutchinson said he represented 90,000 Baptists throughout the province—a denomination greater than that of any other two Protestant denominations in the province. He said the government had done for the temperance people and expected it to do more.

Rev. R. H. Stavert, of Harcourt, Kent Co., grand lecturer of the Sons of Temperance in New Brunswick, also spoke briefly in support of prohibition.

Premier Fleming's Reply.

In replying to the delegation Mr. Fleming said he could give them no answer as to what the feeling of the government was regarding the bill which had been submitted, as he had had no opportunity to read it. "We will take up the draft measure you have asked for," he added, "and consider its provisions as soon as possible, and I can assure you that it will have not only the most thorough, but the most sympathetic consideration. This government will do what it feels well to do. The cause of temperance and sobriety, I am not in a position to differ with you as to the need of advanced legislation along the lines laid down. I have always been a prohibitionist. I have always held local option views on the question of prohibition and I have never found reason to recede from them."

"We may differ as to the best means of working out this scheme, but whatever we do, our course will be dictated by what appeals to us as most likely to serve the cause of temperance and sobriety."
"My decision will be made entirely regardless of what support it will bring from a political standpoint, or what opposition it may cause. I will do what I think to be right, if I go down to defeat within a month."
"There is a feeling abroad that governments are mainly concerned to trim their sails to every wind of popular opinion, that higher considerations do not usually dictate their attitude to questions of public policy. But this view is erroneous. I am indifferent to the political aspects of this question as long as the people are not in a position of question, and I would not run counter to my convictions for the sake of either political opposition or support. A politician's position is not so pleasant that there are not times when he would not mind being relieved of office."

Great Changes Already.
"As Mr. Smith has pointed out, there has been a great change in the last three years. You came to us three years ago asking for a prohibitory measure, and we did not give it to you. There were features in the old act that made it impossible to close the saloon."

"We promised to make important amendments to the act and give the temperance people a square deal. We kept our promise. One of the amendments we introduced provided that the voters in any district might have an opportunity to vote on the license question and secure the abolition of licenses. That was an important change. In Ontario the temperance people have to secure a three-fifths vote before they can abolish the saloon. But we believe in the rule of the majority, and we gave you more favorable conditions."

"The temperance people have taken advantage of this amendment. In Campbellton, Dalhousie and Durham votes have been taken and the temperance people secured majorities. The parishes of Harcourt and Richibucto Continued on page four.
