BANGOR LOSES TO FREDERICTON

Fredericton, N. B., July 7.—Fredrickton won from Bangor today after making four errors and looking like a beaten ball team in the first inning. The final score was 6 to 7. Fredrickton was without the services of Bob Ganley, who is under suspension for infractions of discipline rules and played under the direction of Pat Duggan, who has been appointed manager, the position he held so satisfactorily during the years of 1911 and 1912. Ganley's period of suspension is of five days and it is likely that at the end of that time he will be back with the club and directing the playing once more. Jack Fryer filled the vacancy in the outfield today and left nothing undone except for a bad throw in the first inning.

The last eight innings of the contest were replete with spectacular plays, including a couple of double-barreled infield stunts, and some of the best outfielding by the Fredericton trio and Larry Conley, in his old hunting grounds, but in a Bangor uniform. Pete Condon did the pitching for Fredericton and with the good support he was given proved very effective, only six hits being garnered off his offerings, while Wallace, who was on the mound for Connaughton's team, was hard hit in spots, including four safeties in the sixth, three in the eighth and two, including Keane's home run, in the ninth. Connaughton was the first man up in the game and he took no chances of somebody else winning the \$10 offered by a couple of local fans for the first home run by a local player on the home grounds this week, and cracked out a four-baser the first opportunity that offered.

Gold hitting caused all the runs except Bangor's tally in the first inning, and one scored by Harry Duggan in the eighth. The Fredericton outfielders and manager Connaughton's all round work at second base were the deciding features of the game.



AUSTRALIA ONCE MORE VICTORIOUS

Philadelphia, July 7.—The Australian cricketers defeated the representatives of the United States and Canada, in the test match completed today on the grounds of the Germantown cricket grounds by one wicket and 43 runs. The visitors declared their second innings closed after scoring 415 runs for a total of nine wickets, with Barsley, who was not out, scoring 142. The United States and Canada team was retired for their second innings for a total of 150 runs. H. A. Furness, with 41, made the highest score for the defeated side. A. Hoskins, the New York player, was bowled by Crawford for a total of seven runs. H. A. Reid of Toronto, was run out after making 18 runs, while P. E. Henderson, the other Toronto player, was bowled by Emery when his total was seven. F. G. Goodman of Montreal scored four. The Australians had scored 233 in their first innings last week and the United States and Canada 99.

SPORTOGRAPHY "GRAVY" Blackburn, Once Famous Negro Boxer, in Prison.

Half a dozen years ago Jack Blackburn, one of the greatest colored boxers in the ring, was put out of the running by participation in negro festivities. The "Giant Killer" attended a dance one night, and, after assimilating a few drinks, began showing off his hardware. This wasn't a razor, but a nickel-plated gun—one of the new automatic kind, which, as Irvin Cobb says, "you start in shooting by pulling the trigger merely, and then have to throw a bucket of water on it to make it stop." Joe showed his admiring friends how the gun worked, and when the smoke cleared, in his famous and useful right hand, disabling that member so that Joe was never the same again. When he began fighting again he couldn't close his right hand, and soon lost his welterweight title, and was whipped through Walcott's hand "bumped off" one of his friends. Blackburn and Walcott were in the ring history, but, like Jack Johnson, they couldn't stand prosperity. Blackburn was sentenced to prison for three years, and he is expected that he soon will be released. At the time he was sent to the "pen" Blackburn looked like a coming champion of the welter and middleweight divisions. He had the entire Marquis of Queensberry bill of fare at his command, and would tackle anybody not more than twice his height. It is said that from the day the prison walls closed behind him Blackburn has trained constantly, and has kept himself in the best of condition. He is permitted to box with other prisoners, and has acted as boxing instructor to the sons of the warden and to prison officials. He captained a prison baseball team. PLAYERS BATTLING HONORS MUSIC AND BASEBALL TODAY 3.15

Joe Jackson, Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker are running one, two, three in the race for premier batting honors in the American league, with little difference in the margins of a week ago. Olat Henriksen of the Red Sox has come up into fifth place and Beall, the outfielder who went from Cleveland to Chicago, has been doing such fine work with the bat that he now stands in seventh place, next to Eddie Collins of the Athletics. There are only 17 hitters in the American League who, at this midseason date, are in the 300 list. Every player who has been in 15 or more games is included. It is interesting to note that Joe Jackson and Tris Speaker are the only hitters who made a "century" of hits. Jackson has 106 and Speaker just an even 100. In the National League championship race, infielder McDonald of the Boston Braves has the distinction of leading all the players who have participated in 15 or more games. He has a mark of 440, made on 37 bare hits in 84 times at bat. McDonald's margin over the next man, Hyatt of Pittsburgh, who has hit for 387 in 30 games, is 75 points; Hyatt, in turn, having 14 points over Crandall of New York. Cravath, of Philadelphia, however, is the real leader with 35, having been in 56 games, in which he has made 65 hits in 185 times up. Dabbert of Brooklyn and Voss of Pittsburgh are high among the every-day men, while Titus of Boston and Zimmerman of Chicago, are tied with Louis Wagner at 33.



BIG TROT AND PACE RACING AT CLEVELAND

Cleveland, July 7.—Almost perfect racing weather and thousands of racing enthusiasts helped to open successfully the first meeting of the grand circuit at North Randall track. As is usual on Tavern "Steak" day, when the millionaire owners pilot their own colts, the grand stand was crowded, largely with society people. Seven entries were called to the post in the Tavern "Steak" for amateur drivers only, which was divided into three preliminaries with \$1,000 purses for each, the final to be raced on Friday for the rest of the \$5,000 purse. Uhlman, the world's champion trotter, failed to break the track record of 1:58.3, established by himself three years ago, going the mile in 1:59.3.
