POULTRY SHOW AT HARBOR HOUSE THIS WINTER

Preparations Under Way
for Big Exhibit at end of
this Month — Practical
Sermons on the New Year

Harland, N. B., Dec. 31.—On Monday and Tuesday Seth Jones, the provincial poultry superintendent and Amos Downey were here making improvements and additions to the permanent poultry exhibition station at the Harland Poultry Farm, which is under the management of Robert Kidder.

On Sunday morning Rev. A. S. Hazel of Woodstock conducted the Church of England service in Burt's Hall. At the close the celebration of the Holy Communion was held. Rev. N. Franchette, the rector here, conducted the services in Woodstock in Mr. Hazel's absence.

In the United Baptist church on Sunday evening there was a special Christmas service, conducted by the pastor, Rev. S. W. Schumann, who delivered a learned and most impressive address. There was also special music by the choir.

Since the invasion of the country by cattle buyers from points in Maine it is now quite difficult to secure good beef animals, and as a consequence, prices have taken quite a leap upwards. The farmers have received very good prices for their cattle, but the result has been disastrous to the local consumers.

On Sunday evening in the Methodist church the pastor Rev. P. A. Fitzpatrick gave a most impressive and earnest address, touching the closing of the old and the opening of the new year. He took for his text, Matthew 5:38—Seek ye first the Kingdom of Christ and His righteousness and all these things shall be added to you. He said the new year seemed to be a sort of squaring-up time and the proverbial turning over of a new leaf. He exhorted his hearers to profit by the failures of the past and set themselves a high standard for 1914, relying upon the promise of the text for the fulfillment of their ambitions. He cited many instances to encourage the Christian to persevere even though the task should be hard. At the close of his address he called for volunteers to stand as a pledge of the determination to make the coming year the best of their Christian experience and the greater part of the congregation rose with alacrity. A short testimonial service followed and many gave evidence of their earnestness in the cause.

The organization of the brass band is going on apace and on Friday night a meeting of those interested will be held in the harbor house. The committee to select the talent and allot the instruments. Music will then be secured and practice commenced at once. It is expected that a D. C. band will be the leader of the new organization. The prospects look bright and by spring time it is hoped to have a fairly good musical organization.

MODERN THEATRES HIT BOSTON'S FAMOUS OLD PLY HOUSES

Effect of "Movies" Being
Felt by the Park and
Tremont.

NEW ENGLAND IS
CHEERFUL ABOUT 1914

Former Nova Scotian, now
Boston Broker, Goes into
Bankruptcy — News of
Some New Brunswickers.

Boston, Jan. 1.—The New Year opened with an outlook in business circles in New England more favorable than was the case one year ago when the country was preparing to face a new administration at Washington with its uncertain tariff, currency, Mexican and trust regulating policies. General stock market liquidation appears to have about reached its end, and a more hopeful sentiment has displaced the pessimistic feeling of the summer and fall months. Two recent bank suspensions in Connecticut have little effect on the general situation. Many persons who sold out their holdings in New England railroad shares in the same companies at much lower prices, which are gradually hardening. New Haven and Boston and Maine railroad problems are by no means all solved, as much financing remains to be done, but the pessimistic feeling among stockholders has disappeared. The textile industry is in fair condition and the number of idle hands is gradually diminishing.

A Boston broker, Freeman I. Davidson, who experienced hard sledding during the general slump, has filed a petition in bankruptcy in the United States district court. His schedule sets forth his liabilities as \$183,314.44 and the assets as \$74,230. Among his creditors is Sir Frederick W. Borden of Canning, N. S., Minister of Militia and Defence in the Laurier cabinet. Sir Frederick holds securities for a claim of \$12,700, according to Davidson. Davidson was formerly a Nova Scotian. His troubles were partly due to the failure of the Butte Central Copper Co.

When Gov.-elect Walsh takes office next week the state public utilities board will regulate railroads, etc., is due for an overhauling, according to friends of the new head of the Commonwealth. Frederick J. MacLeod, a native of the British Isles, is chairman of the board, but is doubtful if he is molested.

A studio building and two costly houses have just been built on the beautiful estate of John M. Longyear, a millionaire, on Fisher Hill, Brookline. The houses are to be occupied by Adam H. Dickey and Archibald McLeod, a native of Moncton. Mrs. Longyear and Messrs. Dickey and McLeod are prominent Christian Science leaders. The estate is near the harbor, and is one of the most elevated in Boston and vicinity and is widely known as showplace.

The moving picture business and the advent of modern theatres are having an effect on such famous old playhouses as the Boston, Park and Tremont. The Boston Theatre will expire soon and in the case of the Boston and Park it is stated that they will not be renewed. The future of the Tremont is also in doubt. B. P. Kelch has the largest theatre in North America. It is possible that both the Park and Boston will become moving picture houses.

Rev. John Ellis (a native of St. Stephen), who resisted efforts to bring him from Tokyo to Boston for trial on charges of abducting his daughter, is now advertising manager for an English newspaper in the Japanese capital and is also a teacher of schools. The Boston officers who went to Tokyo for Ellis returned this week. They said that Ellis maintains a mansion and a retinue of servants, and has public opinion in Tokyo in his favor. In the meantime Mrs. Ellis is earning an income by selling a series of story of her trials and troubles to a Boston newspaper.

Miss MacVane, of Cambridge, whose recent arrest in Italy as a spy stirred the diplomatic departments of two countries, will probably become a singer at the Boston Opera House. Miss MacVane's troubles in Italy are said to be due to an Italian naval officer whose suit she had rejected and who denounced her to the government as a spy. In any event the rejected suitor proved himself a splendid press agent. Miss MacVane's father, Dr. Silas MacVane, is a native of Dorchester. Dr. Silas was a professor at Harvard. Besides the operatic singer, another daughter, Miss Edith, an author, is seriously ill.

A delegation from Yarmouth is urging President Calvin Austin of the Boston and Yarmouth Steamship Co. to grant an improved service to the live Nova Scotia port. The Yarmouth citizens want four round trips a week from March 1st to Jan. 1, to handle the increasing business. President Austin is planning to improve the service, as traffic warrants.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid, and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased for \$10.00 per acre.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid, and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased for \$10.00 per acre.
