

Two New Brunswick  
Girls Class Leaders

Miss Margaret Louise Scovil and Miss Polly Kathleen Scovil of Queenstown Win High Honors at Hartford Hospital—Five Nurses at Top of Graduating Class All Canadians—Miss Ida Vivien Corbett, St. John, and Miss Kathleen Hand, Woodstock, Graduated.

Gagetown, June 6.—At the graduation exercises of the Hartford Hospital Training School for Nurses, Hartford, Conn., held on the evening of May 31, at the Nurses' residence, two Queenstown young ladies, Miss Margaret Louise Scovil and Miss Polly Kathleen Scovil, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Scovil, of Queenstown, led their class, which numbered forty-two members. Miss Louise Scovil, whose average was 91.8, received the Dr. Oliver C. Smith prize of \$50 for highest standing in practical work and theory, and would have carried off a special prize of \$50 for practical work, had regulations permitted. Miss Polly Scovil, who came one-tenth of a mark behind her sister, won the second prize of \$25, awarded by the executive committee.

Both Loudly Applauded.

Both young ladies, who are very popular at the training school, were loudly applauded as they came forward to receive the prizes, which were presented by Dr. Phineas H. Ingalls,

chairman of the committee.

Canada was very much to the fore at the exercises, the five nurses at the top of the class being four Canadians, and one Scotch girl, the latter, Miss Elizabeth Jeffery Riddell, being the winner of the remaining prize in the senior year, while in the intermediate and junior years, Canadians were among the prize-winners. Other New Brunswick girls in the graduating class were Miss Ida Vivien Corbett, of St. John, and Miss Kathleen Hand of Woodstock.

Many to Go Overseas.

They keynote of the whole graduation ceremony was strangely that of patriotism, and made the Canadian visitors feel very much at home. The leading address of the evening, given by the visiting nurses' association, emphasized the need for more Red Cross nurses, and called on the nurses to place that call foremost when choosing their line of work. Already a large number of the class are planning to enlist for overseas when the remaining weeks of their course are over.
