VICTORIAN ORDER REGULAR

Report from Mrs. Hanington
Nurses of Canada
of Investigations W
Given and Benefit

At the regular monthly meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses, held on Tuesday evening, November 4, at the home of Mrs. George F. Smith, report from the Chief Superintendent of Nurses of Canada, Mrs. Hanington, was submitted to the members. This report embodied the results of Mrs. Hanington's investigations with the city, referred to the help that had been given to her while on the part of the Victorian Order of Nurses for the Dominion, the benefit that had resulted from the consultations with the members of the Board of Health, and to the assistance given by Miss Jones, a nurse in St. John, of the order, devotion to her work has been a source of comfort to the branch in St. John.

Mrs. Hanington referred to the increased demand for better health conditions and said that public health is demanding that the Victorian Order change its methods to meet the conditions as they exist today. The effort is toward co-operation with the Provincial Department of Health in order that a definite programme for public welfare may be materialized. The idea that was put forward by Dr. Roberts at the Government rooms on October 10, for the coordination of all the organizations hitherto carrying on work of public welfare independently, and that these exert all their influence toward a co-operation would conserve energy, time, money, and prevent overlapping. This highly commended by Mrs. Hanington, who characterized the conference on that date "as one of the most remarkable efforts along the lines" that she had ever attended. She also stated that if the programme—first, to organize effort back of the government, further the work of a Provincial Committee on Public Welfare, secondly, to ask the Minister of Health to establish under his department and jurisdiction the Victorian Order Nurses in all towns and communities in the province who desire the services of Public Health Nurses, carried out, New Brunswick, opinion must soon take a large part in public health matters in the Dominion.

Mrs. Hanington in her report referred to the fact that in St. John the Victorian Order had been established for twenty-one years, and it was now necessary to extend further the work of this branch to meet the insistent demands of the opinion. To do this the present system would have to be enlarged to include all the needs of the city, public and private, and in place of the district nurse, the T. B. nurse, the Child Welfare nurse, and the strangely misnamed person, the "Hall nurse," there would be a public health nurse so organized and supervised that St. John would be the best mead of service in all branches.

Mrs. Hanington pointed out that there are 450 odd children attending the Free Kindergartens, for Dr. Roberts demands medical inspection. Dr. Mabel Hanington, who already the inspection of 8,000 school children, with the assistance of but one nurse, has arranged that this inspection will come through the Health Department, and will also form part of the Child Welfare work of the nurse in each district; her report will be accepted by the Health Department, and a plan of procedure has been worked out by Dr. Hanington and the head nurse of the order. The monthly report of this work will be sent to Dr. Hanington and will be included in her report to the Board of Health. This extra work necessitates extra nurses as the duties of the present staff are already over capacity, leaving no leisure for rest or recreation.

Carlton district as well as St. John, require each another nurse. The plan to divide the city into districts, a nurse responsible in each one, every branch of the work was referred to as part of the campaign for better conditions advocated by the order.
