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### APPLIES FOR THE JOB OF BEACH CENSOR

Although Seventy Years Old Offers to Take on Strenuous Job.

OFFERS TO SERVE WITHOUT ANY PAY

Would Not be Too Hard on the Girls in Scanty Bathing Costumes.

Atlantic City, June 12.—Commodore William Tangay, 70 years old, a retired Philadelphia manufacturer, who owns a fine estate near the bathing district at Somers Point, the bayside city, wants to get an official, unpaid beach censor. The commodore lumps about with a cane, but he is willing to undertake arduous duties for the good of the resort and the good of the girls.

Not Too Much Restriction.

"Although I'm 70," he said, "I'm still able to see right well without the aid of glasses. I understand the city has no funds available to pay the services of a censor for the beach. I'll take the job for nothing. The people seem to want a censor right bad, so why not please 'em? I have my own ideas about what should be allowed on the beaches here, and I'll say I'm not in favor of restricting the girls too much in their swimming togs."

The above offer was an outcome of the general invitation of Mayor Robert Crissey, of Somers Point, to hold talks over on the mainland from his resort, to elphely damsel who insist on going bare-limbed and wearing one-piece bathing suits, to enjoy the freedom of the beach there any old time Atlantic City or other watering places might bar them from their strands.

The 72-year-old chief executive still stands by his guns despite vigorous protests that have come from several quarters, particularly among the women of his home city and neighboring hamlets.

Up to the Women.

The Rev. T. D. Stultz, pastor of the Methodist Protestant Church at Somers Point, believes the question is one for the women to settle themselves. "The fair sex has the right of franchise. They are citizens and can express themselves. I think it entirely within their province to make plain to the mayor what their desires may be. It has been my experience close to fifty years in the ministry that they are quite capable of handling such matters at this without any other assistance."

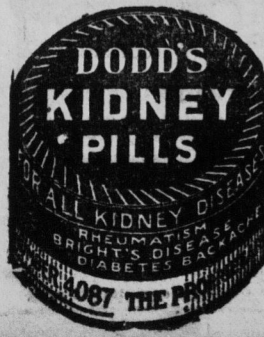
### Australia Won From All England

England Dismissed for 187 Runs — Australia Scored 191 for Three Wickets.

London, June 12.—In the second test match on Lord's grounds here Saturday, the English cricket team representing England was dismissed for 187 runs in a little over three hours, whilst the Australians scored 191 for three wickets before stumps were drawn. The King attended the match until luncheon, and members of both teams were presented to His Majesty.

The poor performance by England was mainly due to weakness in batting, the exception being Captain Douglas and Woolley. The rest failed signally before the fast deliveries of Gregory and Macdonald and the crafty slowballs of Armstrong and Malley. The Australians hit 73 in the first ten overs, taking 'big risks like a team assured of victory.

Jack and Clifford Behan, father and son, landed in Vancouver at 2:30 p.m., Pacific time, Saturday, after travelling 136 days.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dill, who were at Harrison Mills, B. C., today are expected in Vancouver by Tuesday or earlier. The other contestant, Charlie Burkman, who has plodded across the continent alone, was not heard from tonight, but he is not far behind the Dills.

### Run Runners Have Decoy Auto Now

Small Motor Used to Attract Police Attention While Big One Makes Its Escape.

Fredericton, N. B., June 12.—What is said to have been something new in the part of run-running was employed here yesterday morning by parties said to be making tri-weekly round trips over the international route from the source of supply at St. John to Houlton and other points in Maine.

In the middle of the night recently the hum of the engines of the powerful run-running cars has been sufficient to awaken people from their slumbers in the district of the city through which they passed. One of these cars is especially noisy; its engine makes an exceptionally loud hum.

Friday night, or rather early Saturday morning—for it was about three a.m. the hum of what seemed to be the big run-running car was heard; it took one of the usual routes through the city, but it was a small car and seems to have been merely a decoy to attract the attention of the police for a few minutes later the loud hum of the powerful, big run-runner was heard. It dashed through the city at a mile a minute gait and was seen safely away towards the Maine border.

### Minto Mine Owners Confer With Hanna

Anxious to Sell Coal Stocks to the C. N. R. for Use on Lines.

Toronto, June 12.—John Henderson, chairman of the Minto Coal Mine Operators' Association, and D. A. Taylor, manager of the International Co.'s mines at Minto, N. B., conferred with D. B. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, yesterday afternoon on the question of coaling the Canadian National Railway's eastern lines.

The main difficulty, it was pointed out at the conference, was that the mines were from five to ten miles from the main line of the C. N. R. It is believed, however, that a discussion with the mine operators may relieve the situation. Messrs. Henderson and Taylor left the city last night in a hopeful mood.

### Tent Caterpillars Have Stripped Trees

Sheffield and Maugerville Districts Badly Hit by This Destructive Pest.

Fredericton, N. B., June 12.—Apple orchards in Sheffield and Maugerville have been completely denuded of foliage by tent caterpillars. Hundreds of trees have been stripped. The trees will recover later in the season, but if the insects strip them again next year it will mean the absolute destruction of the orchards. J. D. Tothill of the Dominion Entomological branch, with headquarters in Fredericton, was called to both Sheffield and Maugerville on account of the ravages of the caterpillars and also visited Douglas Harbor. There was nothing he could do however. The time for checking the insects was last winter.

### Barns Destroyed in Gagetown Fire

Fire Fighters Had Hard Time to Save House—Damage Covered by Insurance.

Gagetown, June 12.—Shortly after 2 o'clock on Thursday afternoon, fire broke out in the barn of the residence occupied by J. S. Sutherland, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and quickly demolished a second barn and spread to the ell and roof of the house, giving the Gagetown volunteer fire brigade one of the hardest fights they have ever had to save the house. Some really heroic work was done by some of the firefighters, who worked on the roof regardless of smoke and flames. The small boys formed a bucket brigade to bring water from the creek before the hose got down to work, while a company of men and women emptied the house of furniture.

It was after four when the fire was at last under control. The two barns were burned, half the roof burned on the house, and the ell completely wrecked. The interior of the house is in a bad condition from water and smoke, but all the contents were saved.

The property so badly damaged is owned by Robert F. Davis, of Cranbrook, B. C. It is understood that the loss is covered by insurance. Mr. Davis was informed of his loss by wire soon after the fire. The origin of the fire is not known.

ALLIES ORDER WITHDRAWAL

London, June 10.—Armed Germans south of Gleiwitz in Silesia have been ordered by the Inter-Allied Commission to withdraw to the west of Oder River and the Poles in the same sector have been ordered to withdraw to be boundary between Rybnik and Kattow. This will be followed by the successive withdrawal of the Poles and Germans in opposite directions until the whole of the plebiscite area is clear of armed civilians.
