BEAUCE-C.B.C. TRANSMISSION TOWER

Question No. 2,370-Mr. Rodrigue:

Does the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation own a television relay transmitting tower in the Constituency of Beauce and, if so (a) where is it situated (b) in what year was it erected (c) what was the cost of the project (d) who carried out the work (e) what contractors took part in the construction (f) what was the value of each of the contracts (g) what is the power of the transmitter (h) what is the radius covered by the transmitter (i) which engineering firm prepared the technical report (j) what is its annual maintenance cost (k) are new studies under way presently concerning the site?

Hon. Gérard Pelletier (Secretary of State): I am informed by the C.B.C. as follows: (a) The C.B.C. owns a television rebroadcasting transmitter, CBVT-1, located adjacent to Highway 24, 2¹/₂ miles northeast of St. George de Beauce; (b) 1967; (c) \$56,227; (d) Work was carried out under supervision of C.B.C. engineers; (e) and (f) RCA Victor, transmission facilities: \$44,580; G. Morissette, building: \$3,400; improvements to property: \$2,200; Land, legal fees, surveying: \$4,144; Provincial sales tax: \$1,903; (g) five watts; (h) Service is not omnidirectional hence there is no radius of service. St. George de Beauce is southwest of the transmitter and from south to northwest the estimated Grade A service is 3 miles; Grade B is eight miles: (i) C.B.C. engineering headquarters; (j) Approximately \$2,000; (k) Further study by C.B.C. engineers shows that due to the terrain some areas receive an inadequate signal. An application has been submitted to the CRTC for the relocation of this station to overcome the problem while maintaining satisfactory service in those areas where the signal is now acceptable.
