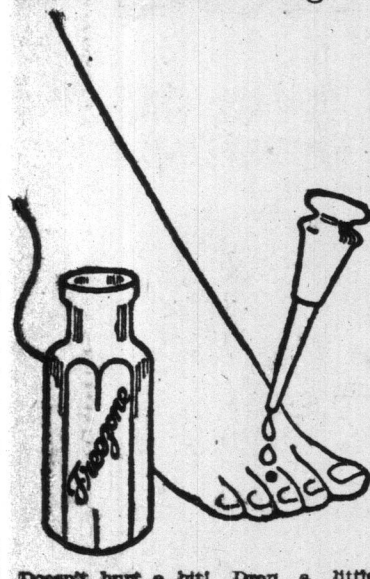

BRITISH EMPIRE BEST PROMOTER OF WORLD PEACE

Dominions Have Great Part
To Play, Says Hon. N. W.
Rowell.

TELLS LEAGUE PURPOSES

Large Audience in Masonic
Temple Hears Geneva
Conference Report.

"Canada and the League of Nations"
was the theme of an eloquent address
delivered last night by Hon. Newton W.
Rowell to a splendid attendance of the
men's and women's Canadian Clubs of
London, in the Masonic Temple.

The speaker was introduced by Rob-
ert Green, president of the men's
Canadian Club, who occupied the chair.
In doing so Mr. Green said:
"We have not only one of the great-
est men in our country to speak to us
but one of the men who has done the
greatest things for our country, and
who has participated in one of the
greatest conferences ever held in the
world."

Mr. Green also reminded the audi-
ence that the speaker of the evening
was a London boy, one of whom they
were all proud.

Mr. Rowell at the outset said:
"Your president has referred to the
fact that I am a London boy, and in
this connection I am reminded of an
incident of my early political career
by seeing in this audience my old
friend, T. H. Purdom."

First Political Speech.

"The first political speech that I
ever delivered was in this city in the
hall at the far side of Clark's bridge
in the interests of Mr. Purdom, who
was then a candidate for the Provin-
cial Legislature. This was on a Sat-
urday evening. On the Monday evening
the Conservative party held a meeting,
and an invitation was extended to
anyone on the opposite side who wished
to say anything for his party. I re-
sponded to the call, but was followed
by Ed Meredith, Mr. Bapty and other
Conservative orators, and the result
was a headline in a local paper the
following morning, 'A Youth Named
Rowell Severely Castigated.' This
said Mr. Rowell amidst a storm of
laughter, 'I came in for a baptism of
fire right at the start of my political
career. I introduced the subject of his ad-
dress, Mr. Rowell said that the primary
function of the League of Nations is to
preserve the world's peace by some
other means than war. It was for the
purpose of settling international dis-
putes by peaceful means, but was not
meant to supersede the usual diplomatic
methods."

Would Have Averted War.

"Within the past three months," con-
tinued Mr. Rowell, "I have met a man
who said to me that if there had been
in existence in June and July, 1914, such
a body as the League of Nations, the
great war, from which humanity has
suffered so much, would never have
taken place. That man was Lloyd
George. This shows the great necessity
of the co-operation of nations in pre-
venting war."

The speaker then went on to enu-
merate some of the functions of the league.
It sought to promote more humane
conditions in connection with labor; to look
after matters affecting the health of
nations, such as the prevention of the
spread of epidemics, and to safeguard
the interests of the people.
Referring to another aspect of the
league's work, namely the appointment
of a commission in connection with
the taking over of the Saar valley and
mines by France from Germany, Mr.
Rowell said that Ex-Mayor Waugh of
Winnipeg was a member of this com-
mission and was doing splendid work.
Will Meet Yearly.

Mr. Rowell gave some interesting
details of the composition of the league,
mentioning that it would meet once a
year in Geneva, and that a permanent
secretary-general and a large secre-
tariat staff had been appointed, and
would be stationed in that city.

"Now," said the speaker, "what in-
terests Canada in all this? My an-
swer is: Canada has now made a larger
investment in the world's peace than
she has made in any other cause in her
history. She has given \$10,000 of her
bravest and her best and tens of thou-
sands more who have done glorious
work. She has not only given of her
less than two billions of dollars, and if
it was worth while to do all this,
then it is worth while to put forth
every effort to preserve the peace of
the world, that peace which our Cana-
dian corps fought for and helped to
make possible."

"Before the war each nation looked
upon the other as a potential enemy
and was continually prepared for war,
maintaining all its paraphernalia for
defence or offence. Nations were com-
pelled to form alliances with other
nations to preserve the 'balance of
power,' and the culmination of that
alliance of nations was the awful war
from which we have just emerged."

Humanity Cries Out.
"The heart of humanity cries out
for some newer and better means of
settling international disputes, and
nations should not look upon each other
as potential enemies but as potential
friends. They should not co-operate
for the beginning of war but in the
preservation of peace."

Dealing with the work of the Geneva
conference, Mr. Rowell said that the
members of the league then present
represented no fewer than 46 different
nations, embracing all the world's
greatest races and religions, and was
the greatest international gathering in
the world's history. When these repre-
sentatives got down to business they
soon came to recognize but one thing,
namely, the preservation of the world's
peace.

Referring to the personnel of the
league, Mr. Rowell said that the most
impressive single figure was the Right
Hon. A. G. Balfour, whose remarks
were critical rather than constructive;
the most eloquent was Mr. Viviani, a
child of the people, who as a boy had
sold nick-nacks in the streets of Mar-
seille; the most picturesque figure was
Mr. Paderevski, who spoke with great
earnestness, and the most striking per-
sonality was Dr. Nauss, the United King-
dom explorer. But the most influen-
tial single figure in the whole assembly
was Lord Balfour.

Canada's Place in League.
Mr. Rowell then touched upon Cana-
da's position in the league. He said
that according to the provisions of the
Hague conference the United King-
dom of Great Britain included within
its scope the whole of the colonies, but
in the constitution of the League of
Nations the representatives of Canada,
and the other dominions would not
accept the world-wide character of
each should have the same rights of
nomination as the other nations.
Another matter was the maintaining
of the world-wide character of the
league. It was only natural that with

so many European representatives
present that they should view matters
from their own standpoint, and one
thing that they tried to bring about
was that all new states should agree
to the preservation of all the charac-
teristics pertaining to racial minorities.

Policy of Assimilation.
"Now," said Mr. Rowell, "this is en-
tirely opposed to Canada's policy. In
such matters, it is not our policy to
preserve these peculiarities in our
foreign immigrants. It is our policy to
assimilate these peoples, and under the
free sky of Canada to build up a truly
Canadian nationality. A policy laid
down by world-wide organization
must be world-wide in its application.
The league is not a super-state, and
one of its dangers is that it might
repel more than it would attract."

"The people of the new world are
determined to manage their own inter-
nal affairs, and not to permit them to
be managed by those outside."
"Nothing," continued Mr. Rowell,
"created greater surprise among the
foreign representatives of the league
than the independent stand made by
the representatives of the British do-
minions. These nations had not learned
that if the British Empire had been
built on the same foundation as other
empires of the past it would have gone
the same way. It is founded, however,
on the principle that every country
within its bounds does its own thinking."

"The smaller states of Europe are
so dependent on the great powers that
they do not enjoy the freedom and in-
dependence of the British dominions."
"We have been accustomed to discuss
our affairs on a basis of perfect equal-
ity with the statesmen of Great Brit-
ain," continued the speaker, "and there
is no reason why we should not discuss
them in the same way with other
powers; but for Canada and the other
dominions there is in the future a more
real independence, a greater influence
in the world's affairs by their remain-
ing for all time a part of the British
Empire than as nations standing out-
side. With the experience and knowl-
edge that we have gained we are aware
that in a world reeling from the shock
of an awful war the greatest power
for peace, for freedom, for order and
for stability today is the British Em-
pire."

Held Close Attention.
Mr. Rowell's brilliant and statesman-
like speech held the close attention of
his hearers throughout, and at its close
he was, on the motion of the chairman,
accorded their enthusiastic thanks by a
standing vote, the chairman remarking
that they were all proud of Canada's
representative at Geneva.

The joint Canadian Clubs are to be
congratulated on the splendid success
of the gathering.

**RESTAURANTS MUST
DISPLAY LICENSES**

Health Board Wants Council
To Take Over Plumbing
Inspection.

Recommendation that the inspection
of plumbing be placed under the direc-
tion of No. 2 committee of the city
council, instead of the board of health,
and adoption of regulations for restau-
rants were the two most important de-
velopments at a special meeting of the
board of health last night.

The restaurant bylaw will be referred
to City Solicitor Meredith before being
brought before the city council for ap-
proval.

Details Not Completed.
Considerable detail work remains to be
done on the plumbing bylaw before it
is sent to the council again. Chair-
man Cunningham said that so far as
the board of health was concerned the
plumbing regulations should only relate
to sanitation. They should have noth-
ing to do with licensing or making a
"closed trade" in any way.

H. Saunders agreed with this. He thought
permits to do plumbing should be issued
in the same way as building permits.
There should be no fee for the permit,
and the inspector should be paid by
the city. Ald. Drake also held the
opinion that the combination of
plumbing and building inspection de-
partments would be a good move.

Changes to bring this about probably
will be recommended to the council.
Must Display License.
The principal clause of the restaurant
bylaw will require eating places to dis-
play licenses from the board of health.
These could be cancelled by the mayor
if the places did not live up to the re-
quirements. The original bylaw was
beyond the powers of the council, City
Solicitor Meredith advised. Changes
were made last night to remedy this.
As with the plumbing bylaw the clauses
were framed with a view to public
health only.

Keep Cat in Basement.
Provision was made for the thorough
protection of food from all sources of
contamination. Cats will be permitted
in restaurant basements to war on rats
and mice, but they will not be per-
mitted in the kitchens. All other
animals will be barred from the
premise.

Employees suffering from communi-
cable disease, or in whose homes a
communicable disease exists, will not
be permitted to work. Garbage will
have to be removed every twenty-four
hours except Sundays and holidays.
Pools on display will have to be
covered.
