RATEPAYERS NEED ENLIGHTENMENT ON HYDRO RADIAL BYLAW

At the municipal elections to be held on New Year's Day, the Hydro Radial Bylaw will be submitted to the ratepayers. While other towns and cities have been fortunate enough in having the Bylaw explained at a public meeting nothing along this line has been done in town and there is just a probability that unless interest in the project is stirred up the Bylaw will go down to defeat. In conversation with a number of the ratepayers the consensus of opinion was that enlightenment was needed. The question should be explained in its entirety if Waterloo was to line up behind the municipalities who were favorable. We understand there has been some trouble in securing speakers on account of them being so busy addressing meetings elsewhere. The town of Waterloo has always stood behind Sir Adam Beck and Hydro and it would be unfortunate were the Bylaw not to receive a big majority. It is to be hoped a meeting can be arranged between now and Polling Day.

CITIZEN ALLUDES TO A DANGER

Dec. 18, 1919.

To the Editor:
I wish to call attention to certain conditions prevailing which constitute a menace to public safety. On Tuesday evening I was a passenger on the street car leaving Waterloo at about ten minutes to six, which particular car was ten minutes late on its scheduled trip. When we reached Breithaupt St. the gates at the railway crossing were lowered. For some unaccountable reason the car was not stopped until it struck the gates. Had the rails been in a slippery state, as they are under certain weather conditions, and a fast moving train passing at the time, the results are too horrible to imagine. The details on both sides of the crossing have not been working order for some time, which was responsible for the car remaining on the track and striking the gates. To make matters worse, no street lights are burning at that hour and the streets were in darkness. If the details cannot be operated, then suitable lights should be placed near the gates to enable the motorman on the cars to discern the position of the gates, and these lights turned on at the proper time. If neither of the above mentioned conditions can be remedied, then the Light Commission should see that competent men who are equal to the emergencies when they present themselves, should be placed in charge of the cars at that particular hour.

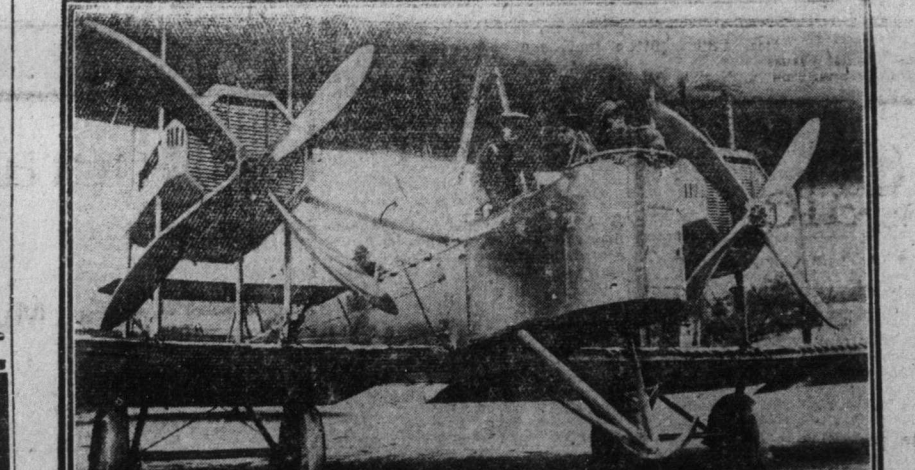
