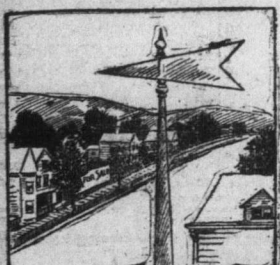

### GRAND RIVER VALLEY'S GROWTH.

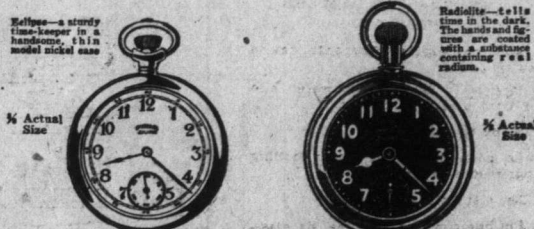

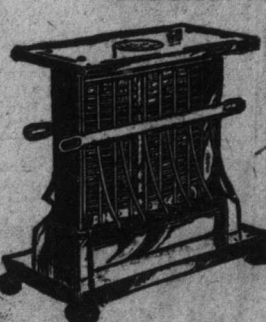

In addition this section has Waterloo, Hespeler, Preston and Paris coming into prominence. A coming city or two can be seen in the quartette, lodged by past and present achievements they are on the way to the status held by the leaders.

In Western Ontario Hamilton is the only rival of the group and the Ambitious City is being rapidly overhauled. This year there is a difference of about 6,000 in favor of the Grand River Valley towns, and from now on the distance between will be steadily and speedily lessened. Inside of five years Hamilton should be overhauled and then will come figures showing the Valley second in this Province only to Toronto in production and wealth.

## AMERICAN NEWS

Happenings of Big Republic Condensed For Busy Canadian Readers.

Alabama Passed an anti-strike law. Two Belgian police dogs found too light for service in New York, brought \$132.50 at auction.

U. S. National Income Bureau says 100 fraudulent charities were foisted on the public last year. John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers of America left an estate of \$250,000.

Cardinal Mercier of Belgium received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Princeton University.

A New York garage keeper, pleading guilty to receiving stolen autos, was sentenced to five years in Sing Sing.

Florida produces 52 per cent. of entire world's supply in the United States.

It is estimated 16,000 Jugo-Slavs will leave South Chicago if the steel strike is not ended in 60 days, taking \$10,000,000 in cash.

Patrick Egan, one of the founders of the Home Rule movement in Ireland and formerly U. S. Minister to Chile, died at New York.

Coming U. S. census is expected to show increase of 1,000,000 farms since 1910, when the number was 6,361,522, valued at \$40,000,000.

Practically all the 54 Dutch ships totalling 598,552 tons, requisitioned by the U. S. in March, 1918, have now been returned to Dutch owners.

Atlantic City is to have an ocean garden four blocks long, costing \$20,000,000, through a combination of the Ritz-Carlton and Lippard Hotel systems.

Among the 80 contestants already entered for the U. S. army's proposed trans-continental airplane race on October 9 is Capt. De Laverne, a French ace.

Three bids, the highest \$5,800,000, were submitted for the purchase of the Government-built powder plant city of Nitro, W. Va., which cost \$70,000,000 to build.

New York Health Commission says the city may have to commandeer milk for sale to poor families.

A survey of 11,000 families showed one child in every three suffers from lack of milk.

National Coal Association accuses United Mine workers of trying to "hold up" people of the U. S. for \$1,000,000 annual increase in coal prices, which would be the result of granting demands for 6-hour day and 5-day week at 60 per cent wage increase.

Former claim adjuster, testifying at the investigation of charges of graft among employees of the New York state industrial insurance fund says grafting was reduced to a system and that the money was "split three ways."

Proposals for establishment of a council for settlement of industrial disputes, replacing the recently discussed at the labor and industrial conference called by President Wilson to meet in Washington, Oct. 6.

Transport Northern Pacific, which left New York Sunday for Brest, will bring members of the commercial missions of Great Britain, France, Italy and Belgium to the United States for international trade conference to open in Atlantic City, Oct. 20.

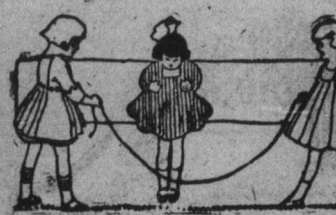
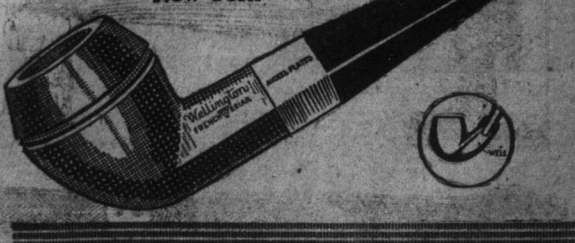
