No doubt you have some little grievances to complain about; and are justified in saying, that you will not be satisfied but will continue to agitate until these little griev-- ances have been settled.

I was pleased to hear you say that you desired nothing but what was in the Treaty, because now we understand one another perfectly.

I was also pleased to hear you say, that, while you would continue to agitate constantly, till these little complaints were settled, you would do so quietly and peaceably, from year to year, until the remedy was obtained. This is the proper way for
