SNAKES THAT LIVE IN THEES.

Reptiles Whose Venom Causes Mad-

. ness Hold a Mountain Grove. "The strongest and most agile snake

"The strongest and most agile snakes in the world, perhaps, live in the Londonesa, Dolores county, Colo.," said the city freight and passenger agent of the Wabash recently.

"Some time ago I was traveling through the southwestern portion of the state and chanced upon Lone plateau. My Mexican guide told me much about it that excited my curiosity, but nothing so much as the stories of the strange species of snakes which inhabit the mesa. I cies of snakes which inhabit the mesa. I was surprised to hear that they live in trees. Unbelievingly I demanded that he take me to their forest home.

"One morning just as the sun was rising we started to find the snake trees. For hours we trudged over the dried plain toward a dark green clump on the mountainside. The trees stood exceed-ingly close together. Between the trees we made our way as quietly as possible. Suddenly he stopped. There on a limb lay a remarkable snake. Like an emerald rope it was stretched along in the dim light. Jose whistled softly. At once a triangular head arose. Two eyes, glosming many colors, like opals, were gleaming many colors, like opals, were fastened upon us. A red tongue shot out in contrast to the green head. Suddenly Jose clapped his hands. The snake coiled itself on the limb.

"'Would you see it climb, senor?' said

"I nodded, and he stepped forward, raising his staff. The reptile reared himself and hissed in anger. Instinctively I retreated. Jose thrust at him with the staff. Like a flash the slim green snake struck the staff. Three times I heard his fangs hit the oaken stick. Then he turned and with easy speed wound his way up the trunk to the topmost limbs, which swayed and bent under his weight. Apparently it was no effort for the reptile o climb the straight trunk of the tree.

Several yards farther on we found a tree fairly alive with snakes. A loud hissing greeted our arrival. A vigorous tapping by Jose caused a speedy cension after several reptiles had been struck by his staff. Upon its end I found drops of greenish venom and inquired its nature. Jose shuddered slightly. Then he told me that it was harmless to the veins, but if swallowed would drive men mad. And then he told me how jealou Indians in times past had ruined their rivals with a potion of the venom concealed in food. We killed one of the snakes, and today the most valuable curiosity I have is the emerald skin from the Lon mesa.
