BIBLE CIRCULATION.

From the National Bible Society of Scotland during 1885 we imported 3065 Bibles and 1818 Testaments, and from the British and Foreign Bible Society, 1022 Bibles and 6800 Testaments. Included in the latter were 5000 penny Testaments, which we dispose of for three cents each:—a marvel of cheapness.

GRANTS RECEIVED.

Our thanks are due to the National Bible Society of Scotland, the British and Foreign Bible Society, and the Religious Tract Society of London, for favorable terms for Bibles and books for Colportage. To the Religious Tract Society of London our thanks are also due for a free grant of tracts. Drummond's Tract Depot made us a grant of 500 copies of "Good News" and 500 copies "Gospel Trumpet," monthly, and also a grant of temperance tracts.
