Probably many years have elapsed since two thunder storms equalling those of Friday night and Monday have occurred here within so short an interval. Which of the two was most intense would be difficult to decide, as they both appeared to have reached the climax in severity. That of Friday night was accompanied with the greatest amount of thunder and lightning, and also proved most destructive. While Listowel escaped any serious damage, other neighborhoods did not fare so well. During the storm James Leonard, living on the 6th con. of Elma, had a horse instantly killed by the lightning. The animal, which he valued at \$100, was in close proximity to his barns when struck. In Grey township, a barn, the property of Thos. Mitchell, lot 15, 9th con., was fired by the lighting and entirely consumed, together with the contents, consisting of a threshing machine, buggy, 200 bushels of oats, 100 bushels of wheat, all his field seeds and a large quantity of dried pork. Two farmers named Daniel McLean and Andrew Edmonson, one living near Bayfield in Huron, and the other near Jarvis in Norfolk, also lost their barns and contents through the lightning during the same night. At Cranbrook the chimmey of V. Gramm's dwelling was destroyed by the electric fluid; while in Berlin and elsewhere much damage was done to buildings and property.
