## ALLIES FORCED

(Continued from Page 1)

It is apparent that the concentration of the Franco-Belgo-British troops in the southwest corner of Flanders is as strong numerically and in equipment and leadership as is that of the Germans.

It has developed that the appearance of the German reinforcement in Belgium, some six hundred thousand strong, was not the result of the sudden and forward march from Germany of second line troops. These men have been transported from other parts of the great front and constitute a formidable force of campaign hardened warriors who have been on the firing line from the commencement of hostilities.

The necessity of this vast shifting of combatants, which is in response to the will of the allied general staff, who forced the Germans to accept the north as the principal zone of contact. The result is the stripping of other portions of the battle front, which at many points has ceased to become more than two lines of entrenchments, containing scattered forces of infantry and artillery, neither of which are of sufficient strength to assume the offensive.

It is worthy of note that running at convenient intervals behind the allied line is a network of railway which appears to be in excellent operation and which has been of inestimable value in the direction of concerted efforts in force at any point within a few hours.

Two potent facts take shape, therefore from the bewildering series of operations of the last few days. The first is that inasmuch as retreat for the allies under extreme left flank would be a grave setback and costly strategically and in men and war material, the allied general staff is confident that they can hold their ground.

The second fact is that the Germans were forced by the allies to throw their greatest force into the north. The Germans do not control as perfect a system of railroads as that behind the allied line, and the sudden shifting of the offensive to another zone by the allies would, therefore, find their adversary at a permanent disadvantage. We may look, therefore, for important developments in the rugged and wooded region between the Meuse and Moselle Valleys within the next few days.

## PARIS IS CONFIDENT AS EVER

[By Special Wire to The Courier]

PARIS, Oct. 27.—Paris today began another 24 hours of waiting for news from the north, where the fiercest fighting of the war is now going on, concerning the progress of the allies.

The announcement that the Germans had been unable to make headway after their costly crossing of the Yser canal brought keen satisfaction to the people of Paris. Previous to this statement the movements of the enemy in the north had awakened considerable inquietude in the public mind. Unofficial explanations followed this news saying in an attack particularly violent by an adversary powerful and tenacious, such affairs were inevitable.

It was said that one point where the Germans were able to gain momentarily, this could not exercise much influence on the operations generally. Stress also was laid on the difficult ground which the enemy had to traverse; that a similar movement, which turned out unsuccessful, was attempted recently by the Germans on the River Meuse at St. Mihiel. These constant violent attacks which were so costly, would also, military men pointed out, manifestly wear down the Germans little by little. Theories regarding the exact purpose of the movement of the invaders varied, but the allies seemed sure to-day of further maintaining their positions.

News from Fumes, on the route to Dunkirk, which presumably is the objective of the Germans, tells of the heroism displayed by the Belgians who once more are in fight against the invaders. The Belgian army withstood the violence of the German cannonade and mass attacks of infantry without flinching. Though the trenches of the Belgians were riddled by machine gun fire, the Germans were unable to cut through the position. The stand maintained by the defenders has created much admiration on the part of the allies. The battle of October 25 was marked by a terrific artillery duel, which the allies sustained and even gained some advantage. In the evening the Germans attempted several infantry attacks which brought them on the right bank of Yser, but all these attempts were repulsed with enormous losses.

Before dying Senator Emile Reymond, the president of the National aviation committee, whose machine was brought down by German gun fire last week, dictated a long and clear report of his reconnaissance which was very useful to the French commanders.

Sensor Reymond's death also was the occasion of a stature of honor. His machine had landed between the trenches of the French and Germans and where the latter were particularly strong, the French had sought for twenty days to dislodge them strategically which was slow and difficult process and costly in men.

When the aeroplane fell, the Germans rushed from the trenches and fell upon the machine. There upon the French engaged the Germans in hand-to-hand fighting which assumed a real violence and after some time the allies succeeded in gaining the much wanted position.
