Grace Church Vestry Meeting

At the Vestry meeting of Grace Church, which was held on Monday January 28th, excellent reports were presented by the officers of the church and the various societies connected therewith. The Rev. E. A. Slack, who has been in charge of the parish only since last May, gave a very interesting account of his work during this period, and thanked the congregation and the societies for their hearty co-operation in his work. The Church Treasurer reported the finances in good condition and that two-thirds of the cost of the repairs to the Rectory, which were undertaken this year, had been paid off. The Women's Auxiliary reported a balance of over \$400, and the A. Y. P. A. showed a balance of \$40. Both of these societies had contributed to the decoration of the Rectory. The Sunday School had \$65 on hand, and the Missionary Treasurer, reported that \$121 had been sent to the Missionary Fund. The officers for the year were re-elected by acclamation and are as follows: Mr. R. Smith, Rector's Warden; R. O. Buchan, Peoples' Warden; R. M. Spence, Secretary-Treasurer; Dr. R. J. Vance, Vestry Clerk and Sec. Treas. of the Cemetery Fund; Miss Davidson, Sec. Treas. of Mission Fund; W. H. Torrance and W. G. Spence, Auditors; D. Davies, Lay Delegate. Sixteen sidemen were selected to form a nucleus of a sidemen's Association, which is intended to include all the adult masculine members of the congregation. Plans were made for monthly meetings of this association the officers of which are to be selected at the first meeting early in February. The Vestry selected a committee composed of Dr. Vance, I. Baker and A. Lovejoy to assist the Wardens in raising funds to pay off the balance due on the repairs to the Rectory, the ensuement of which is to be celebrated by a banquet. The encouraging reports and the active interest taken by the members give promise of a very bright outlook for the future of Grace Church.

Looking Forward

In a short two months time spring will be here and with it comes the opening of the motoring season and its flock of tourists from across the border and elsewhere throughout Ontario and all parts of Canada. The opening of the new Dundas Street Highway has placed our village in a most strategic position to cater to a vast tourist trade. It is contingent that our village council, village organizations and business men devise ways and means whereby we can advertise Waterdown and gain a due percentage of the tourist trade.

It is estimated that several million dollars was spent in Ontario last year by tourist from all over Canada and the United States. It is also only reasonable to deduct that the greater part of the money was spent where suitable facilities were provided. For instance in our larger towns and cities where hotels and restaurants cater to tourists, and also where free parking grounds are becoming more and more the fad throughout the United States and spreading into Ontario and Quebec. Where tourists stop they replenish their stores of provisions, gasoline, oil, etc. and bring business to the locality. It is in this regard in which Waterdown can make an effort to reach the tourist trade.

The old school grounds would make an ideal parking ground for tourists and would require but a small amount of effort and expense on the part of the citizens to provide suitable facilities for those who might wish to park there. The Bachelors' Club had this in mind when formed last fall, as well as tennis courts for next summer. It is not possible for the club to carry on this work without the hearty co-operation of other organizations and the citizens of the village.
