London, March 7.—A despatch to the Central News from Athens gives the following summary of the reply to the utilmatum of the powers, which Greece will hand to the dipomats to-morrow when the time expires in which a reply can be made. THE INAUGURATION. Schintey Goes in and Cleveland Goe

Washington, March 4.-The inauguation of William McKinley as Presi dent of the greatest republic on earth was attended by ceremonies which could scarcely be exceeded in pomp and splendor. To-day also Grover Cleve-land for the second time passed from the exercise of the high office of President and re-entered private life. In his capacity as ex-President he has but one Hving contemporary, his im-mediate predecessor, Benjamin Harri-

mediate predecessor, Benjamin Harrison.

The proceedings of the day were characterized by all the imposing spectacular effects and demonstrations of popular interest which have become a growing feature of inaugural ceremonées as the nation has advanced in population and wealth. Between forty and fifty thousand men formed in procession, partly military, partly civic, and escorted the retiring President and President elect to and from the Capitol. At least twenty thousand people witnessed the administration of the oath of office on the eastern portine.
