

Chairman of Chicken Coops Suggested to the

Board of Health-Railway Cattle Pens Still Complained of as a Nuisance.

The board of health met in regular meeting yesterday afternoon, with Chairman Dunlop and! Messrs. Bray, Wilmore and Pritchard present. The report of the M. H. O., Dr. W.

R. Hall, was submitted as follows: Gentlemen,-Since your last meeting the city has been free from contagious diseases. The warm, moist weather has emphasized the existence of many nuisances to public health; consequently the number of complaints has been greater than at other sea-sons. The odor from the shipping pens of pigs at the Grand Trunk and the C. P. R. stations, although we think all ordinary precautions have been observed, is certainly a nuisance to public health, and a damage to ad-

joining property.

In my opinion the only way to deal properly with the matter, is to insist on their removal outside the city. This the board cannot do but I think the city council might arrange the matter, and would advise that it be referred to them with our recommen-

The executive health officers hold their annual association in Kingston this year, on August 14th and 15th. The reports was received.

CATTLE YARD NUISANCE. The report of Inspector Guttridge also contained a clause with reference to the stench arising from the railway cattle yards and bog pens. The inspector dwelt at length upon the nuisance thus created.

He stated that the offensive hen house on Lacroix street, which form-ed the basis of discussion at the last meeting of the board, had been removed, and the nuisance thereby eliminat ed. The balance of the report consist-ed of accounts of dead dogs, cats and defunct chickens, which had encum-bered the public highways, and had been interred by order of the inspec-

The clause with reference to the hen house began as follows: "In regard to the complaint made by Mr. Jacques to the chairman of the hen house on La-croix street."

Chairman Dunlop facetiously marked that the inspector had distorted the facts and that he was far from aspiring to such a high honor as the chairmanship of a hen house. The re-200.00 chairmanship of a hen house. The re80.00 port was adopted amid laughter.
100.00 50.00 lib.94 sharing that according to the sanitary by-laws he could not grant permission to tap house drainage into wooden box sewers. He considered this regulation a hardship and advised that those having connection with box drains should be prevailed upon to substitute glazed pipe sewers so that all may be allowed good and suf-

The engineer's communication was received and referred to new business. It was moved by Dr. Bray and seconded by R. Pritchard, that the clause in the M. H. O.'s report regarding the hog pens be referred to the city coun-

It was decided that Chairman Dun-lop and Dr. Hall should be sent to the Provincial Health Convention at Kingston, and that in the event of either being unable to go, Dr. Bray should fill his place, The city engineer addressed the board with reference to the sewers

spoken of in his communication. The matter was left in the hands of The board then adjourned.
