When the Little All Right company went out the Little All Right company went out of existence, it was sold for a good round sum. It was stolen afterward by some fake company, and a long lawsuit re-

"You may remember that Little All Right used to slide down an inclined wire from the first balcony to the footlights, keeping his balance by means of a paper mbrella. It was then regarded as marvelous. There are performers today who do the same thing in evening dress while smoking a cigarette and with nothing to balance them except their bare hands. After the white acrobats had time to practice they beat the Japs at their own game. Same thing with juggling. Our fellows soon caught on and heat the ori-

entals at every turn. "I remember one of the most fetching things the Chinese did was to keep a lot of paper butterflies in the air by the aid of a fan. The uninitiated never discover-ed that these butterflies were kept in the air exactly the same distance above the head of the performer by means of an invisible silk thread attached to them. No Chinaman attempted to do the trick with-out the thread, but in a little while a number of American jugglers did the same butterfly trick without the help of

the invisible threads.
"The feat was beautiful and attractive but after awhile it became so cheapened by constant use that it was dropped from the bills of all first class places of amuse ment and relegated to the cheap side show tents, along with most of the Chinese and Japanese acrobats and jug-



The Gong and Bell Play the Most Prominent Parts.

Traditions without number are associated with the origin of nearly every musical instrument in use in China at the present day. String and reed instruments such as were used by the aboriginal tribes were the first known. Next came the drums, which were first used to incite warriors on the battlefield to deeds of valor. There are many kinds of drums, distinguished by names indicating their size and use. Stone preceded metal as a musical substance. In the earliest classes musical stones are mentioned. Sixteen in number were hung by a cord, and the performer pounded out the strains with a small mallet. The stones used by the emperor were made of jade.

Though with most people the trumpet

Though with most people the trumpet has been given first place among metal instruments, in China the bell takes precedence. The sound is made by striking the rim with a stick. The use of the bell as a musical instrument is, however, largely confined to religious services and processions. Not unusually it is concert-

processions. Not unusually it is concerted with other instruments.

The gong is even more popular than the bell. The Chinese gongs are of three kinds—the temple gong, the Soochow gong, which is shaped "like a boiler," and the watch gong, which is used to strike the watches, or divisions of time. The gong is probably the most conspicuous at a theatrical performance of any of the various instruments. It is supposed also to strike terror into evil spirits.

Flutes, fifes, conch shells, clarinets and

Flutes, fifes, couch shells, clarinets and the reed organ are the commonest wind instruments. The latter is made by inserting 19 reed tubes into the upper surface of a gourd. The reeds are pierced near the base to prevent the emission of sound until stopped by the fingers of the performer. The mouthpiece resembles the spout of a kettle and is inserted in the side of the gourd. The favorite instruments among the more cultured Chinese ments among the more cultured Chinese are stringed. These include the she, the k'in, which is said to "restrain and check evil passions and correct the human heart;" the p'i-p'a, a four stringed gui-tar; the yueh k'in, or moon k'in, named from its moon shaped soundboard, which has four strings standing in pairs, tuned as fifths to each other, and the Su-chun, or "standard lute," which has 12 strings, yielding exactly the notes of the 12 Luh,

or tubes, invented by Ling-lun.

From the beginning of the recorded history of China until the present day music has at all times had an important place in the political system of the Chinese. Its influence on the people and the forming of their character, either for good or evil, has never been underestimated. Confucius said, "It gives finish to the character first established by the rules of proprie-ty." Since Confucius time has done nothing to lessen the Chinese belief in the inestimable value of music. At the present day there exists an imperial board of music appointed for the purpose of keeping alive the music of the an-cients and of exercising a strict censorship over all compositions.

HUNTING DEER.

A Good Season in Ontario.

The deer hunting season in the province of Ontario is considerably shorter in duration than any other of the localities where deer are found in bundance, the close season being from November 16 until October 31 of the year following, allowing only fifteen days for the hunter to enjoy this grand sport. The Grand Trunk Railway system have given this matter considerable attention, and the dis-tricts reached by its railway are the finest hunting grounds in the Dominy ion of Canada. Through their courtesy we are permitted to give some in-formation which will be of interest to

The returns are not quite all in, but those to date show 88 licenses were issued to non-residents, and 4,200 to residents of the province of Ontario; also 105 moose licenses, making a total of 4,393; but the probabilities are that at least 5,000 licenses were issued. The hunters during the 1900 season have not been quite as successful as those that went up into these districts in previous years, which was accounted for by reason of the bad weather that was experienced during the last open season and does not mean that there is a diminution of deer, as they are increasing in numbers each successive. increasing in numbers each successive year, owing to the very stringent re-gulations which the Government en-force.

The open season for the shooting of moose was opened in 1900 for the first time in five years, and is now closed for three years. There were taken out during the open season by the express companies alone 1,621 deer, weighing in the aggregate 176,312 pounds. Chief Game Warden 176,312 pounds. Chief Game Warden Tinsley states that not less than 5,000 deer wree taken out of the northern country during the open season, as the number carried by the express companies, large as it may be, cannot be taken as a criterion of the total number killed, as those killed by the settlers are not sh pped, and a large number of hunters from towns and villages adjacent to the hunting grounds have the deer killed by them taken to their respective homes by teams

to their respective homes by teams and other conveyances.

There is one clause in the deer hunting regulations which should be eliminated by the Ontario Government, and that is, allowing the killing of deer in the water. This is considered a hunting by any true brutal way of hunting by any true sportsman, and by cutting this clause out it will not only be a means of still further protecting deer, but will be recognized as an important addi-tion to the game laws, by every true lover of the sport. There has been considerable talk in connection with extending the open season, but it is to be hoped that the Ontario Government will not countenance any su suggestion at the present time, as the present open season protects the deer from promiscuous slaughter and obfrom promiscuous slaughter and ob-viates the likelihood of their deple-tion.—Montreal Gazette, Jan. 9, 1901.
