McCOIG COMPLIMENTS THE PLANET.

A representative of The Planet met him this morning and was greeted with an open hand and a friendly smile.

MURDER FOLLOWS CRITICISM.

Man Slain For Commenting on Child's Nervousness at School.

Carmi, Ill., March 25.—Rehearsal of closing exercises at a country school house near here Friday ended in a tragedy and the arrest of a farmer for the murder of a man who had been his friend and neighbor for years.

George Nicholson and John Kurd were seated together, listening to and criticizing the recitations given by the children. Both had little daughters taking part in the program, and there was no hint of trouble until Nicholson's little girl started to say her piece.

Kurd made a remark on her nervousness, which Nicholson resented, and in a moment both men were quarrelling. Nicholson drew a revolver, and, pressing against Kurd's side, fired. Kurd died instantly.

AN ASSAULT CASE

The Charteris school assault case, where a young lad named Henry Morris, colored, was charged with assaulting a white school-mate named Ben. Haviland, came up in County Police Court at eleven o'clock yesterday morning.

The complainant, Charles W. Haviland, accused the colored boy of kicking and beating his son, doing him bodily harm. The three trustees of the school, along with five of the school children, were present to give their evidence in connection with the affair. The witnesses for the prosecution were: Dorcy Colby, Stanley Warneck, Willie Shaw, Annie Baker, Ben. Haviland, Charles W. Haviland and F. W. Charteris.

Those for the defense were: Henry Morris, Charles Morris and John Morris. The evidence went to show that on the day in question John Morris had taken his children over to a field where the other boys were playing football, and had dared any of them to come and fight with his boys. Witnesses for the defense claimed that young Haviland had kicked the colored boy in the shins as he was passing him. Afterwards Morris set upon him and slapped him with his open hand and kicked him considerably. It was apparently what was going on at the time an everyday school boys' row, but in those days such cases never went to the Police Court, but as a rule were finally settled with the school-master's birch.

Judge Houston found young Morris guilty, but in doing so, he gave the father of the boy quite a severe lecture, saying that he was mostly responsible for the fracas in that he encouraged his boy to fight. He warned the other school children that they must not taunt young Morris about the circumstance afterwards. Morris was let off with the costs, amounting to \$2.50.

W. G. Richards acted for the complainant and R. L. Brackin for the defense.

NEW WELLS IN ROMNEY

Norton, Church, Bowly & Benson drilled in two big wells Saturday on the Canada Company lands on lots 20 and 21, concessions 4 and 5, naturally without being shot. They will have up 1,200 barrels of tankage shortly. Work was started to-day on five more wells by this company. They have several hundred acres of Canada Company lands in that vicinity and have mapped out an active summer's work in drilled up their holdings in the Romney field. They have bought the Harry Horton farm in fee. The house will be used as a boarding house by the workmen on these leases, and the barn is being made into a warehouse. The No. 21 concession, which was reported dry last week, was shot on Friday and is now making over 150 barrels a day.

Laurier Sails April 5.

Ottawa, March 25.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated yesterday that he fully intends to sail for England on April 5.

The Opposition will do nothing to delay his departure, and should the Bourassa resolution regarding "women, wine and graft" on Tuesday prove too troublesome Parliament will be prorogued for forty days.

This will give the Premier time enough to go and return from London. R. L. Borden is suffering from a throat affection that threatens him temporarily with loss of voice, but he expects to be fully recovered by Tuesday.

The general impression here, for some reason, is that the threatened exposures on Tuesday will flax out. Tremendous social pressure is being brought to bear upon both sides to "forget."
