Another daring robbery is reported as happening on King street east Saturday night. Mrs. Jarvis, wife of Ensign Jarvis, of the Salvation Army, was passing along that portion of the main thoroughfare Saturday night, when a man grabbed the hand purse she was carrying and made away with it. He got little for his pains, however, as the bag only contained the small sum of ten cents, and Mr. Jarvis says that the purse itself was not very valuable.

The thief probably thought that Mrs. Jarvis was returning from the Barracks, and that the purse contained the collection.

Tom MacDonald was subpoenaed by the crown, but they dared not put him in the box, said Mr. Johnston. Fred, the man who practically admitted that his evidence was the result of an animus against MacDonald.

Death was due to kidney disease, not to strychnine. Dr. Kerr had intended to give strychnine, and could not now swear that he did not give strychnine.

Mr. Johnston spoke for over three and one-half hours.

The Evidence Against.

Mr. Arnoldi said none appreciated more than he the splendid speech for the defence made by the very able advocate, but it was the duty of the crown to protect the lives of the community. It was a practice for the defence to vilify crown officers. Where the woman got the strychnine was immaterial. The box was evidence that the woman had obtained the poison. He questioned the motives of Mrs. Perkins and her relatives in searching the house, and insisted that her husband's opinion was all suggestive of death caused by the strychnine found in the body. It made no difference if he had uraemia or not. It was as wicked to poison a dying man as a well man.

He denied that it was any part of the crown's duty to call Tom MacDonald. He was one of the implicated parties, yet the defence had not dared to call him to rebut the crown's evidence of the prisoner's connection with him.

His lordship, in summing up, said there were two bold issues standing out. First, was Mr. Perkins' death caused by strychnine poison? and secondly, was the poison administered by the prisoner, and with felonious intent? Four crown doctors had given evidence that deceased had died from strychnine poison, two of whom had given opinion evidence, all suggestive of death caused by the strychnine found in the body. It made no difference if he had uraemia or not. It was as wicked to poison a dying man as a well man.

He reviewed Dr. Graham Chambers' evidence at length, and contrasted his opinions with the evidence of the deathbed witnesses.

Cause of Death.

"If you find a man after death with his body filled with buckshot in the vital parts, you might have some difficulty in concluding that he died from anything else; and if you find the body of a dead man filled with sufficient strychnine to kill him, you will also have considerable doubt in concluding that he died of something else," he said.

The letters appeared to convey all the affection which a woman should feel towards her husband, but was it possible that, while this woman was penning these letters, she was harboring murder in her heart? What was the object of her statements about her husband's physical condition? Were they intended to aid her to conceal the effects of a murderous intention, or were they the exaggerated fears of a woman, whose husband was away from home?

Was the conversation with Mrs. Carter of innocent intention? The talk about rats and gardens did not precede the enquiry for strychnine, but followed the enquiry for the poison. Her husband's name was mentioned in that conversation. Had she him in mind when she asked for the drug, and why should a man "go crazy" because strychnine was in the house.

A Strange Occurrence.

A few days before Christmas her husband returned, feeling in excellent health. He visited his farm, and is there taken very ill. It was a strange occurrence. Suppose that when Dr. Kerr called on the Monday, and that, by mistake, he had left strychnine tablets, though he swears he did not leave any. The tablets were to be taken one every three hours. By what set of circumstances could the man have got the whole of them into his system by Tuesday morning? There was no one else attending him but the prisoner.
