The Walther Concert.

The concert to be given in College Hall this evening promises to be a rich musical treat, and should be well attended by the music loving people of Wolfville. Tickets may be had at G. V. Rand's.

The Yarnoc Times speaks of their appearance there as follows: "There was a large audience at Boston Marine Hall, Tuesday evening, to hear the concert of the Walthers. Their name had spread and great things were expected, nor was there any disappointment. Herr Walther stepped upon the stage, Mrs T. V. B. Binyay took her place at the piano and the first violin solo of the evening began. It was Wieniawski's 'Romance and Polonaise.' The wrapt attention with which the audience listened and the enthusiastic applause and encore which followed showed how thoroughly the playing was appreciated. Herr Walther is an artist of rare ability and being carried away himself in the intensity of his playing, thrills his audience with magnetic power. Especially was this shown in Chopin's glorious 'Nocturne No. 2,' whose grandeur and pathos held all spell bound and was followed, in response to the call for more by another magnificent selection. The Austrian hymn dust was also a grand performance. Madame Walther's singing won her audience at once. Beautiful face and form, a sweet and sympathetic voice evidently highly cultivated, a distinctness of utterance and easy pleasing manner, unite to make her a most welcome addition to the Canadian concert platform. Her solos 'For all Eternity,' with violin obligato, and 'The Letter Song' from Rip Van Winkle, were most heartily encored. The Walthers will always be sure of a warm welcome in Yarmouth.

The Torbett Concert Company.
