Seminary Notes.

Acadia Seminary reopened for the work of the Winter Term January 9th. In connection with this opening it is a pleasure to call attention to the recent acquisition by the Seminary of a work of art of rare value. Owning to the courtesy of Rev. J. G. Coulter White, a graduate of Acadia in the year 1880, there is hung in the reception-room a large picture, nine feet by six in size, from the collection of the late Mr. Ellershuisen, a German gentleman who came to this country a number of years ago, established a settlement and erected a mansion at Ellershouse, Hants county. Mr. White has recently acquired this picture from Mr. W. H. Blanchard, of Windsor, into whose hands it came some years ago. The picture was painted by Mr. Alfred Schoeck, of Berne, Switzerland, for Mr. Ellershausen. It was painted in the year 1872 and is pronounced by competent critics as a bold and successful attempt to set forth a scene in the Alps at once beautiful and sublime. It represents the meeting of the rivers Rhone and Walsereine. Words cannot convey any idea of the beauty and power of the work. The public will be admitted to see it; and to them as well as to the art students in the Seminary it will make its appeal.

News was received this week by friends in Wolfville of the marriage of Miss Edith Rebecca Ellis, daughter of Mr. Eliah E. Ellis, of Perce, and Mr. William John Gordon. The ceremony took place at Moose Jaw, Sask., on Dec. 24th, and the young couple will reside at Drinkwater, in the same province. On Mr. Harris' retirement from the business in 1901, these young men seized the opportunity, and buying out the stock and good-will embarked in business on their own account. Changes have been made in the store from time to time, and it is now one of the finest establishments of the kind in the province. All the latest and most up-to-date furnishings have been employed, including the over-head cash system. Two years ago an addition was built on the west side for the accommodation of the gentlemen's furnishing department. A large room was also added to the second floor for a carpet and house-furnishing department. A large and varied assortment of dry-goods of all kinds is always carried by this firm, and with a large staff of obliging assistants the public are always sure of painstaking attention. Mr. Hales is always on hand to attend to the wants of customers, and Mr. Bishop makes a visit from time to time as his other important duties permit. This establishment is a credit to the town.

Death of John L. Gertridge. In a former issue we referred to the critical condition of Mr. John L. Gertridge, one of the most widely known and respected citizens of Gasperau. His death occurred on Thursday morning of last week, at the age of 70 years. Although always active and full of life and hope, he was a sufferer for many years from a leg-tenness, which ended in the amputation of his leg above the knee, some months ago at Halifax. Since that time, although always cheerful and hopeful, his health has been gradually failing and during the last few weeks he was confined to his bed. Mr. Gertridge was the son of one of the old settlers, the late John Gertridge. He was a man of most kind and genial disposition and was beloved by all. A man of active mind and sterling integrity, he engaged in many business enterprises and was generally successful in his undertakings. He will be widely missed and generally mourned. He leaves a widow and four sons, Charles, in California; Err L., a business man in Hantsport, and James and Frank on the homestead, and one daughter, Miss Nora, who resides at home. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon, and was one of the largest ever witnessed in Gasperau. The services were conducted by Rev. J. W. Brown, pastor of the church.
