FROM THE CAPITAL.

Members of the British Chamber of Commerce Feted by Board of Trade.

THE SUPREME COURT CHANGES.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—The delegates of the London Chamber of Commerce arrived at Rome today and were received by Hon. Mr. Scott, Mayor Cook and several members of the Board of Trade. They were the guests of Hon. Mr. Sifton at luncheon at the Rideau Club. This afternoon they will visit the large industrial plants and be tendered a banquet this evening at the Russell House by the local Board of Trade.

The Supreme Court today was presided over by Sir E. B. Tassier, but on rising it stands adjourned till Monday next, to allow Sir E. B. Tassier to be sworn in as Chief Justice, and permit Justice Armour to receive his commission. It is necessary that the Chief Justice be sworn before the Governor General in Council. It is not known whether the Governor General will come to Ottawa for the ceremony or whether a quorum of the Cabinet will accompany the Chief Justice to Montreal for that purpose.

The position of members of Judicial Committee of the Privy Council does not necessarily follow the Chief Justiceship, and it is questionable whether any new Canadian member of the Imperial Privy Council will be appointed as successor to Sir Henry Strong.

Although no longer an active member, Sir Henry retains for life, or during the pleasure of his majesty, the position of Privy Councillor.

TWO THOUSAND IMMIGRANTS.

A London Clergyman Has a Scheme to Ease

The Congested Districts of the World's Metropolis.

Now in Conference With Interior Department on Subject.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—Rev. Mr. Barr, a Canadian by birth but at present on orders in London, England, is in the city on business with the Department of the Interior. He wants to bring out and settle 2,000 settlers from the Tower Hamlets of London and settle them in Alberta. He has submitted a scheme to writing to the Department and wants to obtain the land in one district and bring out his immigrants next spring.

NARROW ESCAPE.

A Sheffield St., St. John, Woman Nearly Burned to Death.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 19.—Agnes Saunders, a Sheffield St. resident, had a narrow escape from cremation yesterday morning. She went to bed considerably intoxicated and smoking a cigarette. While she slept the cigarette fell and set fire to the bed clothes. Later others in the house smelled the smoke and rushing up pulled the unfortunate woman from the blazing bed and extinguished the flame. She was burned almost over the whole body, but owing to prompt medical aid will probably recover.

THE WINTER PORT.

The C. P. R. Elevators Have Commenced Work for the Export Trade.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 19.—The C. P. R. elevator was used today for the first time this winter, handling a big lot of peas for export. There are 100 cars of wheat between here and Megawick which will be in the elevator in a few days ready for shipment. The road is experiencing great difficulty moving freight owing to lack of engines.

GAGETOWN WHARF.

Mr. Whipple of St. John Awarded the Contract.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 19.—F. R. W. Whipple of this city, who rebuilt the wharves at the Cedars and Holderville, has been awarded the contract to build the high and low water wharves at Gagetown, with 110 feet face. Mr. Whipple also has the contract for the wharf at Palmer's.

ITALIAN PRINCESS.

Another Girl to Grace the Home of the King and Queen of Italy.

ROME, Nov. 19.—Queen Helena was accompanied by a daughter this morning. The mother and child are announced to be doing well. The new Princess will be named Margherita. The child born to the King and Queen of Italy to day is the second daughter, the first, Princess Yolande Margherita, having been born at Rome on June 1, 1901. Had a male child and heir to the throne been born it would have been proclaimed Prince of Rome.

The announcement occurred a month earlier than expected. The King yesterday was shooting on the island of Monte Cretio, when he was suddenly summoned home. He immediately boarded a yacht and was landed on a beach in the neighborhood of Rome. As there was not any embarkation convenience his majesty's companions had him carried ashore on the backs of sailors. A motor car, as it waited and the King soon reached the palace. The birth of another princess instead of an heir to the throne is a great public disappointment.

THE TELEGRAPHERS.

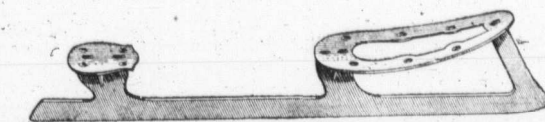
No Definite Arrangements Yet Arrived at With I. C. P.
