### Newfoundlander Dead.

**Mr. Henry Downs Passed Away at Brooklyn, New York.**  
Superintendent Dunn, of the Central Fire Hall, received a letter on Saturday last announcing the death of his brother-in-law, Mr. Henry Downs which occurred at Brooklyn, on Saturday night, the 30th ult.

Mr. Downs was born in Freshwater Valley, St. John's, and worked on his father's farm until the decease of his parent, when he took it over and continued to occupy and work it until twenty-six years ago, he then decided to try his fortune in the Great Republic, having two brothers already there, viz., John, a large contractor, and Michael, who was owner and manager of a soap factory.

Mr. Downs was a man of high character, sterling integrity, and a most consistent and exemplary Catholic. By honest industry, perseverance and economy he succeeded in surrounding himself and family not alone with a comfortable freehold residence but also sufficient to keep him and those depending on him in thorough independence.

About three months ago Mr. Downs was attacked by illness, but it was not considered very serious until a few days before his death, when his friends recognized the fact that he would soon be removed from amongst them, and surrounded by his wife, two daughters and one son, fortified by the rites of the Church, he passed peacefully away on the date mentioned.

Mr. Downs always took the deepest interest in the affairs of his native land, and nothing gave him greater pleasure than to hear of her advancement and prosperity. Besides his own family he leaves three sisters in St. John's, viz., Mrs. Dunn, Mrs. John Ellis (mason) and Mrs. Joseph Murphy (engineer). His brother John died in Brooklyn some years ago, and Michael was accidentally drowned on the Delaware River. To the relatives and numerous friends, both in the United States and Newfoundland, the Telegram extends its sincerest sympathy. Requiescat in pace.

### Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, Oct. 9. From all parts of the Turkish Empire messages are arriving in Constantinople urging the Sultan to declare Holy War. Turkey has sent another note to the Powers asking for intervention, and offering to grant every reasonable concession to Italy. The Turkish forces in Tripoli have been withdrawn to the interior, where they will either wait the Italians, or, if possible, return to attack. Rumor has it that they are short of provisions, and may be forced to surrender.

LISBON, Oct. 9. General Castro, the Minister of War, has resigned. The Government has asked the President to summon Parliament in order to secure consent to certain measures for the speedy trial and punishment of the conspirators in the attempted revolution. The Premier declared that the Republic up to the present has treated the Monarchists with forbearance. Henceforth no indulgence will be shown.

### Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 9. A startling item of war news comes from Constantinople to the effect that the Turkish Governor of St. Jean de Medua, on the Atlantic Coast, has informed the Porte that a vessel flying an Austrian flag, carrying an Italian officer and Italian soldiers, has been sunk by the forts, all on board perishing. An Italian warship then came up and bombarded the town, doing much damage to property.

### Special to Evening Telegram.

BERLIN, Oct. 9. A note from the Turkish Government, asking whether they consider that the time has arrived to seek a basis for negotiations looking toward peace between Turkey and Italy, and under what conditions, has been presented to the Foreign Office. The note contemplates the cession of Tripoli, to Italy under certain conditions.

### Special to Evening Telegram.

CHIASSO, Oct. 9. News from Turkey is of the gravest character. The Italians there are threatened with expulsion. If a massacre occurs, war in that quarter will again burst forth, as it will be almost impossible to prevent an attack on Albania, and that would mean the intervention of the other Powers.

### Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 9. Telegrams posted at the Baltic Mercantile Shipping Exchange state that Turkey has declared grand contraband of war, and the banks are refusing to finance shipments. The loading of vessels has been generally stopped.
