Notes and Comments.

Judging from the comments of the
New York Fishing Gazette on the
proposed changes in the Tariff, par-
ticularly as regards fish, opinion
seems to be much divided as to the
effects. This difference of opinion ex-
ists on the effect the changes will
make on the price of fish and the
volume of trade. It prevails only
among the distributors.

On the other hand, the producers
are much disturbed and Mr. F. L.
Davis, of Gloucester is reported to
have declared that the proposed
changes would be the death of Glou-
cester and the fishing ports. The de-
alers, however, consider Gloucester un-
duly alarmed and pessimistic as usual
when free fish is mooted.

The Vital Statistics for December
31st, 1912, give the population for
Newfoundland and Labrador at 246-
187. According to this computation

we shall soon pass the quarter of a
million mark. What Newfoundland
needs is a greater population to bear
the many expenses of Government of
a people scattered over a wide area
and living in many centres which are
sparsely populated. The births re-
gistered during the year numbered
7,625, the deaths 4,117, giving a net
increase of 3,508.

Cable News.

LONDON, To-day.
Although not officially confirmed, a
report has gone forth of the coming
visit of the British Postmaster Gen-
eral to Canada, connected with the sub-
ject of a state-owned cable to link up
with the Pacific cable.

CETTINJE, To-day.
The new Montenegrin Cabinet under
the Premiership of General Vuko-
itch, was formed to-day, and nego-
tiations with the commanding officers
of the international fleet were im-
mediately commenced for the evacuation
of Scutari, which began yesterday to
be completed by Sunday.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
The Underwood Tariff Bill pro-
claimed by the Democratic party as
an answer to its platform pledge to
reduce downward, was passed last
night by a vote of 281 to 118. Five
Democrats voted against the Bill, two
Republicans voting for it. Four Pro-
gressives supported the measure,
fourteen opposed it, while one inde-
pendent Progressive joined the ma-
jority.

LONDON, To-day.
The Ambassadorial Conference sat
for two hours yesterday, but reach-
ed no important decision. It is not
expected the conference will recon-
vene before May 20th. Meantime pro-
posals, defining the limits and stat-
us of the new Albania will be sub-
mitted to the European Government.
The Peace Conference will assemble
in London and presumably detach-
ments of the international fleet will
take possession of Scutari, pending a
settlement.

NEW YORK, To-day.
The longest living suit in the his-
tory of New York jurisprudence was
settled yesterday. The action was
brought fifty years ago against the
City of New York by Appleby for
damages done property at Eleventh
Avenue, Forty-first street, by a mob
during the Civil War. Appleby sued

for \$7,200, demanded interest and
principle, which would have brought
his claim up to \$42,000. Through a
compromise the city confessed judg-
ment yesterday, and Appleby dropped
demands for interest. He was paid
\$7,300. When the plaintiff brought
the suit he was a young man; he is
now eighty years old. Since the suit
was filed it has seen many vicissi-
tudes of fortune. Nearly all the law-
yers connected with the case, most of
the judges before whom it passed has
died. Nevertheless he had twelve
witnesses, all over seventy years old,
who saw the mob wreck his house.

OYSTER BAY, To-day.
Theodore Roosevelt would have the
States and Great Britain agree to ar-
bitrate any question which might
arise between them, so he told the
International Conference, who are
arranging a Centenary Peace celebra-
tion among English speaking people.
Addressing them, as their host at
luncheon at his home at Sagamore
Hill, although it was said the law-
yers specifically mention the Panama Can-
al dispute, to the members of the for-
eign delegation, he unmistakably re-
ferred to that question as one which
should be settled by arbitration, if a
settlement could not be reached by
negotiation. I am not myself one
who readily makes promises, but once
made I should think it should be
kept.

MONTREAL, To-day.
Some distinguished men will re-
ceive the honorary degree of Doctor
of Law from McGill University in the
course of the next few months. They
will be conferred upon Viscount Hal-
dane, Lord High Chancellor of Eng-
land, Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden, Premier
of Canada, and Hon. C. J. Doherty,
Minister of Justice to Canada. These
degrees will be conferred at a special
convocation to be held in September,
on the occasion of the meeting of the
American Bar Association.

LONDON, To-day.
The Saloniki correspondent of the
Times refers to the ominous appear-
ance of the situation between Bulgar-
ia and Greece. The armies of the two
states are facing one another in Sal-
oniki district, on a war footing. Elab-
orate defences have been constructed
around Kavala. These include forty
cannon pointing seaward to resist at-
tack from the Greek fleet. It is re-
ported that fighting has occurred at
Portos, ten miles south of Drama
Head. There is a report, if not
that the Bulgarians are ready to set-
tle the difference with Greece and
would be willing to forego the claim
to Saloniki, and a portion, if not
all, the hinterland which the Greek
Government regards as her irreduc-
ible minimum.

NEW YORK, To-day.
The ancestral home of George
Washington at Sulgrave, in England,
which it was announced last night
the British delegates to the Peace
Conference, contemplate purchasing,
may become the repository of relics
of the Washington family, which col-
lateral descendants of the first Pres-
ident have offered to the Daughters of
the British Empire. Mrs. Elliot
Langstaff, President of the Society,
formally applied to Lord Weardale
for permission to furnish and de-
corate the manor in event of its pur-
chase in connection with the celebra-
tion of one hundred years of peace.

LONDON, To-day.
The Government has announced
that no more opium will be sent from
India to China this year. It is prob-
able the opium traffic between India
and China will never be renewed.

MEXICO, To-day.
The Zapata forces were defeated in
a fight which lasted many hours, yester-
day, a few miles from North
Cuernavaca. The official report of
General Robles gives the rebel dead
as ninety, while the federal losses
numbered three wounded. The Gov-
ernment denies a report of a federal
reverse at Sonora.

LONDON, To-day.
The Times warns Government in very
circumstantial details of rumors be-
ing spread with regard to oil con-
tracts for the Navy. It adds allega-
tions are being made of personal
connections on the part of ministers
and other prominent persons with
would-be contractors.

PARIS, To-day.
The American Chamber of Com-
merce of Paris has decided to-day to
protest against the administrations of
a section of the tariff Bill. Modifica-
tions will be requested in certain
paragraphs, particularly those relat-
ing to the establishment of market
values on consignments of foreign
manufacturers and examinations of
books by Government officials.

CHICAGO, To-day.
White women who associated with
Jack Johnson, negro heavyweight
champion of the world, were used as
sparring partners, according to the
charges of the Government Attorneys
at the trial. Jack Johnson is charged
with violation of the Mann Law. Har-
ry A. Parkins, Asst. District Attorney,
declared the evidence would show
that Johnson directed his fistic ac-
complishments against women. As a
result of this treatment these girls,
Parkins said, were frequently sent to
hospitals with blackened eyes and
bruised bodies.

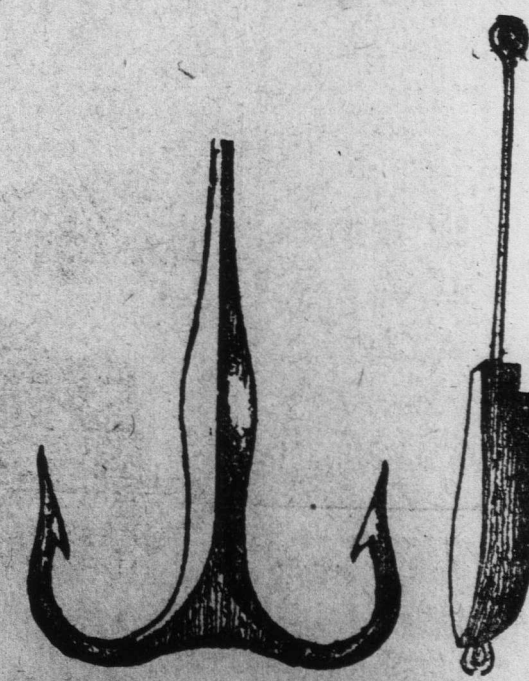
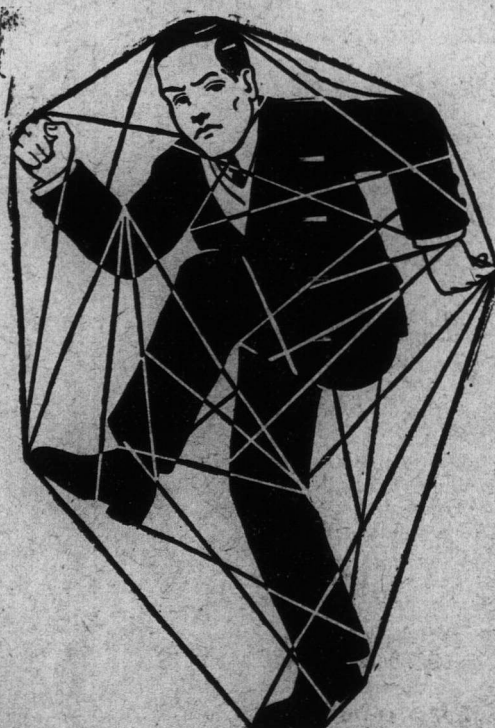
