Copper Contract

New York, April 14.—Additional options for heavy tonnage of copper have been exercised by the British Government since Monday morning. bringing the total purchases within a veek up to about 400,000,000 pounds according to local copper producers. The metal is to be delivered this year, and in this arrangement reflection is presented of the enormous production of American mines and refineries When the present rush of buyers has grown quiet it may be found that some duplication occurred in the recount-ing of orders for foreign govern-ments, but the fact remains that copper is being absorbed through buying from abroad on a scale which was not reamed of eighteen months ago.
The total mentioned above would have been nearly one-quarter of all the copper refined in this country three years ago. At the present time it is estimated that 180,000,000 pounds a month, or 2,160,000,000 pounds a year, is the rate of refinery produc-tion, partly from ore mined in Alaska, Canada and South America. If this year's out-turn should reach this figure and bring an average price of 27 cents, which the British Government is believed to have paid, the copper companies would receive the tremendous sum of \$583,280,000 for their
