Savagery on High Seas

Two Negro Seamen Fought—Both are Severely Wounded.

The British steamer Kassanga, Captain Crockett, 13 days from Cadiz, reached port this morning, bringing a cargo of 4,800 tons of salt, the first big shipment to arrive this season, to Morey & Co. During the passage, a row of serious proportions, in which such dangerous and deadly weapons as shovels and razors were brought into play, occurred on board between two negro seamen. As a result both combatants were laid low and the wonder is that a double murder was averted. The outcome of the row, it appears, was a personal grievance that the foreigners had against each other before leaving Cadiz. Both managed to subdue their passions and ill-feelings, but only for a short time, as after being a few days at sea the storm of temper broke loose and the "niggers" began their mutinous conduct. Hot words were exchanged, followed by blows with fists. Then one fellow, who was evidently getting the worst of it and procured a brick and threw it violently into the face of his assailant. The latter fell unconscious with his lip split, a dozen teeth knocked down his throat and two ugly wounds inflicted near the forehead. However, he quickly recovered and jumping to his feet took a shovel to cleave his adversary with. He did not use that weapon but seized a razor and slashed the other nigger with the blade of it, inflicting a deep wound several inches long and extending from the under part of the right ear along the throat nearly to the chin. Fortunately, none others of the crew interfered and the pandemonium ceased. Both victims bled copiously from their scars and the second one wounded would have bled to death but for the attention given his injuries by Capt. Crockett. On arrival this morning the ship was boarded by Dr. Campbell, quarantine officer, who dressed the wounds of both men and altogether inserted some twenty stitches. The Kassanga was never here before, though her captain was in the Mary House. The ship was built in 1929 at Glasgow. She is 2,813 tons gross and 1,940 nett. She begins discharging her load of salt this afternoon.

General Petain's Swift Rise in the War.

"General Petain, who is in supreme command of the Verdun region, is one of the most picturesque figures in the French Army," says the Mail. "Aged fifty-nine, he was about to retire from the rank of colonel at the beginning of the war, but his high military talents have since found abundant opportunity, and in nineteen months he has risen with unexampled rapidity. Nominated in succession brigadier, divisional general, and army corps general, he now holds the high position of army general."

"General Petain looks wonderfully young, and it is said that he is still his youthful agility and resisting powers to constant exercise, one item of which is ten minutes with the hanging rope every morning before shaving. Should no other point of vantage be available the general never hesitates to climb a tree as to obtain a view of the surrounding country."

"Unsparring of himself, General Petain has the greatest regard for his soldiers. Believing with Napoleon that an army fights on its stomach, he always sees that his men are well fed."

Spirit of Petain's Men.—General Petain, the leader of the French troops at Verdun, secured for certain of the units under his command the privilege of exemption from trench duty for several months on the understanding that they were to be reserved exclusively for use as storming columns.

The Petit Journal says:—"One can imagine the spirit of heroism animating these troops, who laughingly boast that they are all vowed to a glorious death. One of them, who was recently on leave in Paris, was noticed to spending his money very prodigally. When a friend remonstrated, he exclaimed, 'Bah! What's the use of saving? We're Petain's men.'"

Britain's Great Copper Contract

New York, April 14.—Additional options for heavy tonnage of copper have been exercised by the British Government since Monday morning, bringing the total purchases within a week up to about 400,000,000 pounds, according to local copper producers. The metal is to be delivered this year, and in this arrangement reflection is presented of the enormous production of American mines and refineries. When the present rush of buyers has grown quiet it may be found that some duplication occurred in the recent buying of orders for foreign governments, but the fact remains that copper is being absorbed through buying from abroad on a scale which was not dreamed of eighteen months ago.

The total mentioned above would have been nearly one-quarter of all the copper refined in this country three years ago. At the present time it is estimated that 180,000,000 pounds a month, or 2,160,000,000 pounds a year, is the rate of refinery production, partly from ore mined in Alaska, Canada and South America. If this year's output should reach this figure and bring an average price of 27 cents, which the British Government is believed to have paid, the copper companies would receive the tremendous sum of \$58,280,000 for their year's work.

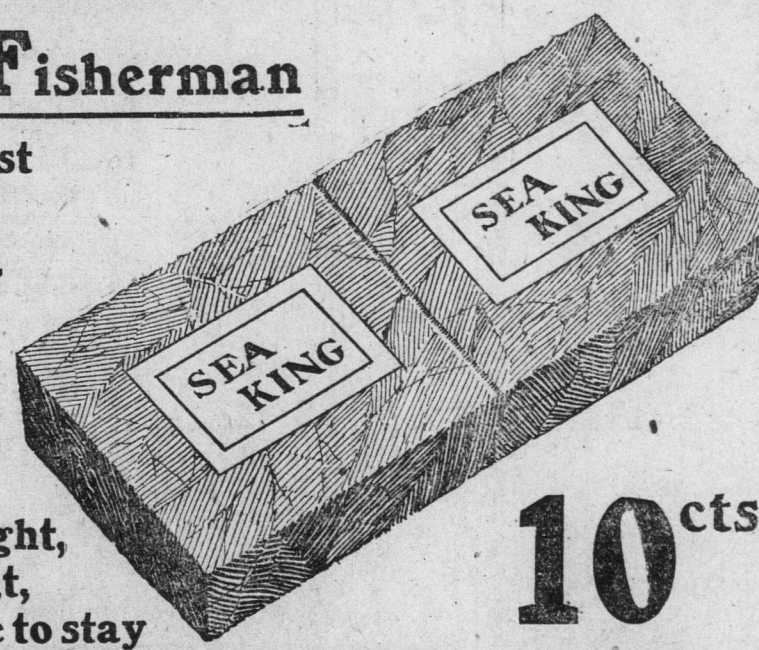
