Annual Baseball Meeting.

And Presentation of Trophies.

At the Blue Puttee Hall at 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening next, 13th inst., the players and enthusiasts of the "Diamond" will hold their annual convention under the jurisdiction of President Hawvermale. The occasion will also be availed of to present to the College Cubs the championship cup and pennant, the B. G. Reid trophy, and the Spalding trophy won by them in last season's series. The inter-town trophy won by the home team will also be presented to Manager Montgomerie. It will be remembered that it was originally intended that the presentation of these trophies should take place at the big Sporting Meet which was being arranged last fall by Mr. Geo. W. B. Ayre, but which had to be postponed owing to the "flu" regulations. After the auditing of accounts and the reading of the officers' reports, the election of officers and officials for the ensuing season will be conducted and the entries of clubs received. It is likely that the "Shamrock" will re-enter under the management of Billy O'Neill, though this is not positive as yet. We understand in this connection that an admirer of these old time champs has promised to furnish them with a complete set of uniforms, if they appear again on the diamond. It is also likely that the formation of a junior league will be discussed by the seniors as several applications have been made to the League in this connection. An announcement will also be made by Hon. W. J. Higgins (representing the Football League) and Mr. Hawvermale on behalf of the baseballers regarding the taking over of St. George's Field; and we understand that if negotiations go through with the owners that both Leagues are prepared to expend a considerable amount for the restoration of the grand stand and grounds. With the return of so many players from overseas it is safe to assume that greater interest than ever will be displayed in the baseball fixtures this year.

red double worsted caps; white cotton lace; men's leather caps trimmed with fur; spinning cotton for working; 6 quires ruled ledgers for copies 1815; 5 quires demy paper for remains 1815; large size brown paper; large size white brown paper; 12 pairs bellows; 6 coal scuttles black tin; cinder sifters on wire sieves; looking glasses; 3 hearth rugs; mops, umbrellas; cinder shovels with iron handles and holes in them; women's half boots; more of the men's fine blue jackets same as came by Alpha at 24—each—50 at least; pair good yarn heading gloves made very large about the wrist and longer altogether than they usually are; 8 dozen grappels; 6 herring nets; the ship-builder's assistant revised and improved by William Sutherland. The old gun marked R.S. put on board the George belongs to Thos. Manned With Sailors.

Trinity, July 12th, 1814.
This with copy of No. 6 goes via St. John's per your Cosmopolite which craft is chiefly manned with sailors and has 248 qts. West India and Madeira fish and 430 bundles hoops. The George sailed on the morning of the 3rd inst. direct for Poole and had a fine time off the land. Enclosed is a Bill of Lading of her cargo. At present there is a fine neighborhood a fine prospect of a voyage and the planters in general have considerably more fish on shore now than they had at this date last season. We have a four-handed fishing punt out here, a constant baitskiff for ourselves and planters and occasionally a cod seine and 6 hands. At Catalina a four-handed skiff, and at the French Shore the schooner Swallow and nine hands. But as soon as dry fish is fit to collect we of course must knock off some of our fishermen. The Mary, I could not raise a crew for and she is laid up here. If I hear nothing from you to the contrary I shall load the Alpha with our first fish for Spain or Portugal and debarking back salt, as it is likely we may dispatch her sooner than either of the other vessels by a fortnight or three weeks, and should the weather be favorable it is not improbable but she may be pushed off by the last of July. Being extremely busy and expecting to write you again shortly by Mr. Garland's Benjamin, I shall conclude this with a sincere wish that the Gannet and John and Elizabeth may soon make their appearance, and remain, Sir,

I have been considering on the probability of the omission of leather gear, etc., by the vessels this Spring. It may perhaps (as you have remarked in No. 1 concerning the late arrival of my indents with you) have been occasioned by the impossibility of your orders to the different trades being completed in time. I see the impropriety of keeping back the whole of the indent until the remains are taken, which part of the business cannot be done until after the books are closed and the planters supplied.
