

Obituary.

MR. JOB COATES.

In referring to the death of Mr. Job Coates, of Upper Gullies, which sad event occurred on the 15th inst., we feel the regret sincere and poignant which always animates one when referring to the demise of a life long friend and neighbor. Mr. Coates had attained the ripe age of 77 years, and though he was in the "sere and yellow" yet retained the kindliness of character, the affability, the bonhomie which endeared him to a host of friends in Conception Bay and other parts of the Donamion. Always a man of splendid constitution and fine physique, Mr. Coates succumbed to short illness, contracting a severe cold which induced death within a week. Mr. Coates was a man of striking personality, a type of the oldtime fisherman-farmer, now sadly depleted in Newfoundland. He was one of the most popular, progressive, industrious and prosperous farmers in Conception Bay, and in a section where farming may be said to be the chief industry. Energy and enterprise were outstanding features in the make-up of a man remarkable even among his contemporaries, and this despite the ills naturally engendered by advanced age. Besides his other industrial activities Mr. Coates operated, and with marked success, for over a quarter of a century. blacksmith shop near his residence in the Gullies. Unobtrusive and unassuming in demeanour, the deceased withal was a man of remarkable intelligence and this trait in his character was appreciated by the deference given to his opinions on the part of old and young. The deceased was a prominent member of the Anglican communion, an earnest church worker and good Christian, and was tolerant and broad-minded with those who differed from him denominationally. By the practice of the virtue of economy by honest toil he earned a goodly competence for himself as the smiling farmlands which ripened under his energetic care bear witness to. One of the oldest of the inhabitants of the South Shore, his passing will be deeply regretted, not merely by his immediate and bereaved family and relatives, but by all the people of Conception Bay. Hospitality was a predominating trait in the character of this worthy man, and his home was deservedly popular as a summer resort for city residents, many of whom received kindly treatment and bounteous liberality at the hands of Job Coates, including our distinguished Chief Justice, Sir William Horwood. Mr. Coates leaves to mourn him a faithful life partner in the person of his sorrowing wife, and one daughter, Miss Jessie Coates, a splendid type of Newfoundland womanhood at its best, and who is now practicing her profession as a trained nurse in one of the largest medical institutions in the United States. A brother also survives, Mr. Peter Coates, besides several other relatives. The body will be embalmed pending the arrival home of Miss Coates, to whom has been bently brcken by sympathising friends the sad and unexpected passing of a dear parent. And now one can but say peace to the ashes, eternal repose to the spirit of this worthy man. The Telegram advances its respectful and sincere condolence to the grieving wife and friends.
