

Movie Producer Decides to Come.

NEWFOUNDLAND TO BE ADVERTISED ON SCREEN.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir, I am very glad indeed to be able to state that Mr. Ernest Shipman, the Canadian moving picture producer, will leave Montreal on the 15th or thereabout for St. John's to arrange for the production of a big Newfoundland moving picture to be shown throughout the world. This will be Mr. Shipman's procedure: he will first meet individually the leading businessmen and citizens of the city, and then at a meeting of same address them on his plans. The making of the picture will begin in August and be finished by the end of September. It will be placed on the market by early October, and from then on for five years it will run in theatres in all countries on this side and in Europe. One hundred prints will be made.

I can say this much of the picture itself: it will embrace all phases of Newfoundland life. Both outdoors and city will be included. Newfoundland's marvelous scenery, both marine and rural, her vast fishery, and other

phases will be shown. It will be a moving picture story, like every other picture, but will at the same time bring in, casually but none the less effectively, the scenery which, when known, will make the island famous throughout the world and result possibly in an influx of tourists.

Mr. Shipman's producing the picture will depend entirely on whether the leading citizens and businessmen of the city will identify themselves with him. His practice in every picture he has made has been the same. Winnipeg, Ottawa, Toronto, Vancouver, Sault Ste. Marie, etc., co-operated with him in the same way. His reason for thus insisting on the prominent citizens identifying themselves with the production of the picture is this: picture making has fallen into disreputable hands too much, and it is his ambition to place the making of Canadian and Newfoundland pictures on a high plane by starting that way. This may explain why he is successful as a producer of Canadian pictures.

I have to give myself a pat on the back—worked hard to get this picture underway, and now that Mr. Shipman is going to St. John's I sincerely hope that the public spirited men of St. John's will lend all the help and co-operation of which they are capable, to have a big New-

foundland picture made for world exhibition. I may say that I have heard from several well known citizens by wire and letter, and I believe the thing will be put over the first day or so after Mr. Shipman arrives.

Mr. Shipman has asked me to go to Newfoundland with him, and it is possible that I shall do so.

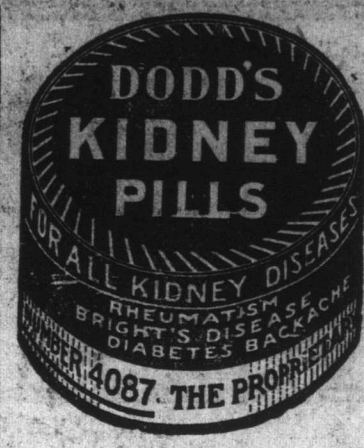

BOBBIE CONNELLY DIES OF BRONCHITIS AND AN ENLARGED HEART.

LINDBROOK, N.Y., July 7. Bobby Connelly, child movie and vaudeville actor, died yesterday at his home here of bronchitis and an enlarged heart, which had afflicted him for three months.

Bobby was one of the highest paid juveniles behind the footlights, moving a vaudeville team of his own. Two years ago the child played in the moving picture, "Humoresque," and later in "The Old Oaken Bucket."

S. S. Millpool in Port.

LANDS INJURED SEAMAN.

S.S. Millpool, Capt. Eves, 11 days from Barry, bound to Montreal, put into port last night and landed a seaman named J. T. Smith who is suffering from a fractured leg. The Furness Withy Co., being advised during the afternoon, had all arrangements completed. On arrival of the ship Dr. Carrell went on board and ordered the man, who has a compound fracture of the leg near the ankle, to the hospital. The accident occurred on the 3rd inst., when the ship was only 3 days out and was caused through the fault of a seaman, falling into the ship's hold between decks. The Millpool is owned by the Pool Shipping Company, West Hartlepool, and is 4213 tons gross, and 2707 net. She is a sister ship of the Seapool, which put in here last year damaged by ice.

Crush at Station.

POLICE OFFICER NEEDED THERE.

The necessity of having a special police officer at the Railway Station on Sunday afternoons and holidays to keep order is apparent to anyone who happens to be in that neighbourhood at the time stated. The four buses plying to Bowring Park are most times crowded with passengers and there is a general scramble for seats. Women with children are often jostled and sometimes narrowly escape injury. The drivers of the vehicles are powerless to keep order, and the presence of an officer of the law is necessary if accidents are to be prevented.
