## Aylmer to Have Football Club

A meeting was called in W. H. Barnum's office, on Friday night to revive the old sport of football in town again, and a large number turned out.

W. H. Barnum gave the boys a vivid description of the old football days when Aylmer used to have one of the best teams in Canada. He told about Foley, of Fall River goal tender of that team, who had not had a goal kicked on him in five years, in the American League. The team then journeyed to England, and in one game alone Foley had six goals kicked on him. It so upset him that he died shortly afterwards of grief. Aylmer in years gone by had one of the four great football teams in the country, Berlin being 1st, Galt 2nd, Chatham 3rd and Aylmer 4th. At that time, the speaker said, there was not a team in Canada that had anything on Aylmer. He remembered one game well, that was played at Hamilton. The Aylmer boys went to Hamilton the night before the game and put up at the Osborne House. The Hamilton players were nearly all Scotchman, and being friendly with the Canadians, dropped around to their rooms. They got a little chesty in their conversation and said that Aylmer might hold them down for four or five goals, but in the end they surely would be swamped. Everybody in Aylmer waited patiently for the news to come over the wire, and when they heard it they could hardly think it possible that Aylmer had won the game by a score of 1-0. When the train came in that night there were hundreds of people with the band at the station. 'Twas a great night. W. W. Rutherford was the first man to get off, and he was quickly nabbed by the crowd, and had to tell the story. In that game, which will go down in history as the greatest game ever played, Aylmer scored their one goal thirty seconds after the ball had been put in play.

The game could just as well be revived in Aylmer, and then the people could see some of the hard fought games that used to be.

The chairman, L. F. Clarke, called the meeting to order, and the officers were elected as follows: Hon. Pres., L. F. Clarke; pres., W. H. Barnum; vice pres., A. Bowly; sec., W. A. Houston; treas., T. B. Nairn; chairman team committee, J. Gibbs.

The name of the team will be The 30th Battery Amateur Club. The club membership fee was placed at the low sum of \$1 per member. It was also passed that a committee of the football team and a committee of the baseball team should see what could be done about grounds.

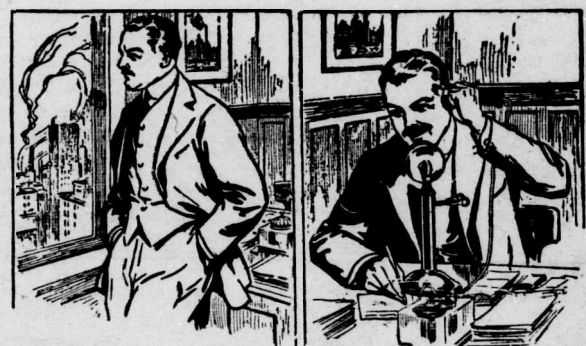
