From South Africa.

We received a letter this week from Mr. W. A. Hare, dated Belfast, Oct. 11. They arrived in that place on Aug. 27. On the 30th of August they were served with new helmets and British warm coats, and together with Baabant Horse and an infantry corps were inspected by Lord Roberts and staff. A few days later they visited the place where the Guards' Brigade made their famous charge, and saw the effects of all kinds of shells from the one pound pom-poms to the big 9-inch shells. He goes on to say:

"On Sept. 23 four Canadian mounted riflemen were out patrolling when they met a large party of Boers. The Non-Com. escaped injury, Spence was shot dead by an explosive bullet, Radcliffe died within five minutes after he was hit and the other fellow is in the hospital with fair chances for recovery. Spence and Radcliffe are buried in a small cemetery near the camp. The C. M. R. built a corel enclosure and made a very fine plot.

Oct. 6 a gun went out reconnoitering with the mounted Canadians, was in action five times, fired 20 shells, dislodged and drove the enemy back in the hills. Capt. Howard with his Colt gun was nearly cut off, he losing six horses and one man wounded, McCarthy, of Ottawa.

That night we had a little excitement in camp. A gunner went to bunk with his coal fire inside his window. The size of this but was about 7 ft long, 3 ft wide and about 3 ft high, has four posts, is covered with a rubber sheet with out sacks for siding. The sacks took fire from the perforated tin of coals, blazing up quickly, leaving the gunner surrounded by the flames. A few fellows turned out, and standing back bursting themselves, left the unfortunate to work out his own salvation.

A cavalryman refers to the pom-poms in the following lines:

There ain't so many men get hit,
It's luck that pulls us through;
Their fire is of no class at all;
It misses me and you.

But when they sprinkle shells around
Like water from a cup,
From that blooming Pom-Pom gun
Well, I'm fed up.

The Pom-Pom fires 136 shells per minute, or at least they fire a belt of 25 cartridges at that rate, each exploding on concussion. Two of these came in the evening.
