Who was Thomas Garrett of Delaware?

Thomas Garrett, who was a Quaker (Friend) of Delaware, assisted nearly 3,000 slaves to escape from bondage; he was at last convicted and fined so heavily that he lost all his property. When the auctioneer had sold his last piece of property to pay the fine, he said: "I hope you will never be guilty of doing the like again." Mr. Garrett replied, "Friend, I am 60 years old nd have not a dollar in the world, but if thee knows a fugitive slave who needs a breakfast, send him to me." M. Garrett lived to see the day when slaves obtained their freedom. What was the Underground Rail-

After slavery was abolished in the North, slaves frequently ran away from their masters and attempted to reach the free states of the North and Canada. A most useful auxiliary in assisting them to freedom, was the God-fearing men and women who composed a chain stretching across the land from the borders of the slave states all the way to Canada. Their method of assisting was to guide the fugitives by night to a place of safety. turn them over to a conductor, who in turn would convey his charges to another conductor, and finally after passing from station to station, the slaves were landed on free soil. This system was known as the Underground Railroad.
