OTTAWA, May 30.—When the House
opened to day the Secretary of State reblied to a reference which Mr. Lister made plied to a reference which Mr. Lister made to him during the all-night session on the 19th inst., that the campaign in North Perth was carried on in behalf of the Government by subscriptions from Tory Senators, and that the Secretary of State did not go to North Perth without the necessary "influence."
