THE WEATHER PROPHET.

Tonorrow, Aug. 18-19 p.m.—The pressure
is above the average throughout the Dominion
and there is an area of depression apparently
developing over the Southwest States. Rain
has fallen in Nova Scotia, and the weather has
been fine in other parts of Canada. Light to
moderate easterly winds have prevailed on the
lakes. Minimum and maximum tempera-
tures: Calgary, 32-72; Prince Albert,
37-66; Qu'Appelle, 38-61; Minnedosa, 37-65;
Winnipeg, 40-61; Toronto, 52-67; Montreal,
57-68; Quebec, 45-65; Halifax, 60-66.

—TODAY'S PROBABILITIES.—The indica-
tions for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes
region (excluding the peninsula and as far
east as Belleville) are: Easterly to south-
erly winds; partly cloudy weather, with local
rains; stationary or a little higher tempera-
ture.

man he was discharged.

—John Cambridge was charged with
breach of the city bylaws at the Police
Court yesterday in allowing a horse to run
at large. The case was adjourned until
Wednesday.

—Mr. Henry Flock, of Toronto, book-
keeper for M. Lamont & Co., has been en-
joying himself in the city for the past
week. He is a well-known London boy,
and goes to Montreal soon to take an im-
portant position.

—Quite a number of people assembled at
the brink of the river at the foot of Mait-
land street last night to witness the
baptism of five candidates for membership
into the Latter Day Saints' Church by
Elder R. C. Evans.

—Over 400 availed themselves of the
Michigan Central's cheap rates to Niagara
Falls yesterday and spent a pleasant day in
sight-seeing. A Wagner palace car was at-
tached to the train and added greatly to
the enjoyment of the trip. The excursionists
arrived home about 2:20 o'clock this
morning.

—The Seventh Fusiliers' band gave a con-
cert in St. Thomas last evening under the
auspices of the conductors and brakemen
of that place. The concert was a success
both from a musical and financial stand-
point. The band spent to-day with the
trainmen of Brantford, who are holding
their annual picnic in that city.

—Residents in the neighborhood of
Fairfield, on the Grand Trunk, are agi-
tating for the erection of an open shed of
some kind in order to afford protection
during boisterous weather. A great many
come to this city from that section, espe-
cially on Saturdays, and if the trains are
late, have often to wait around on the plat-
form in the rain or snow.

—The remains of the late John Doyle,
victim of the fatal railway accident at St.
Thomas last week, arrived here for burial
by the M. C. R. on Saturday. About 400
friends and acquaintances of the deceased
accompanied the remains, the funeral from
the church in St. Thomas being one of the
largest ever seen there. He was a member
of the C. M. B. A., and leaves his widow
deeply and lamentably deplored by a large
circle of relatives and friends.

Pandemonium in Court.
Bonnie Benetti and Nazato Nolsi, two
Italian matrons, had their domestic diffi-
culties adjusted at the Police Court yester-
day. Signorita Nolsi was charged with
assaulting and using abusive language to
her neighbor, Signorita Benetti. As none
of the witnesses could speak English, three
interpreters were engaged in transmitting
the answers to the Magistrate, one keeping
a check on the other two. The complainant
stated that a child of the Nolsi woman
amused itself by throwing stones at her
from the rear of the family mansion. The
complainant retorted with the child's
mother, but was told to go into the house
or she would have some of her bones broken.
Other witnesses testified that the Benetti
woman called the defendant "dirty pig."
The Magistrate advised the parties to cul-
tivate a more neighborly spirit, and dismissed
the case.

The Holiday at Queen's Park.
Queen's Park held a happy crowd of
picnickers yesterday afternoon. As the
proceeds were to go to the fund of the
Mount Hope Catholic Orphan Asylum the
majority of those in attendance were friends
of that institution and patronized the
various refreshment tables with a generosity
which greatly swelled the amount that will
go towards helping the little unfortunate
ones. The feature of the afternoon's
programme was an amateur league baseball
match between the Clippers and the London
West Stars for a \$10 gold piece presented
by Rev. Father Tieran. The Stars proved
too strong for their opponents and defeated
them 24 to 4. Collins and Webber consti-
tuted the battery for the victors, while
Nolan and Lee performed like service for
the Clippers. Stars 24 runs, 16 hits, 3
errors. Clippers 4 runs, 6 hits, 7 errors.

Gave Up the Notes.
Six months ago a Winnipeg drygoods
merchant named William Draper quietly
folded his tent and left for parts unknown,
leaving at the same time a number of ex-
tremely serious creditors behind, among
whom were Messrs. Caldecott, Burton &
Co., and McMaster & Co., of this city.
These two firms felt sore at being
let in the U. S. and determined to follow
up their debtor and at least make life
interesting for him. They employed Lawyer
George C. Gibbons, of London, to attend to
matters, and in a short time Draper was
located in San Francisco, to which place
Gibbons repaired and had Mr. Draper
placed in a cell. The case was fought out
in the Yankee courts, which decided that
Draper should consent to give up certain
notes in his possession amounting to some
\$20,000. When the decision of the court
was made known Draper weakened and
gave up the notes to Mr. Gibbons, who
brought the securities back to his clients.—
(Toronto Empire).
