A FLAMING DELUGE.

Whole Towns and Their Inhabitants Blotted Out of Existence.

Earth Yawns and Swallows People by the Hundred.

Ten Thousand Lives Lost, It Is Thought the Explosions at the Crater Heard Hundreds of Miles—Entire District Buried Under Hot Ashes,

Bundreds of Miles-Erite Districts
Buried Under Het Aares.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 2.—The steamer
Empress of India, just arrived from Japan,
brings additional details of the disastrous
volcanic eruption on Great Sangir Island.
Without any warning signal, without any
sign whatever of impending disturbance,
sign whatever of impending disturbance,
the Gunong Aroo volcano blazed forth on
June 7, and within 24 hours the whole of
the prosperous surrounding country was
devastated. The western coast of Great
Sangir Island is washed by the Celebes
Sea, with the Molucca passage on the
southeast. The island is one of a chain of
n islands near the Philippines. The first report of the eruption was heard about 6
o'clock in the morning, and for four hours
there was one continual stream of fire and
ashes belching forth. After a slight relaxation a flood of fire again began, continuing
two days, heavy rumblings being heard in
the mountains.

TOROMAN BURIED.

The town of Toroma, on the Southern
side of the island suffered then. Dwellings
and other structures crumbled under their
heavy load of dust and ashes, the inhabitants fleeing for safety, while many perished in the ruins. The coccanut plantations, which covered the whole mountain
side, were completely destroyed. Terrific
thunder storms had followed each earthquake. Hot streams of mud and lava
running down the mountain side rendered
traveling unsafe, and those win were overtaken in their flight perished. Reports
from all over the Island indicate the most
disastrous consequences. Whole villages
are submerged and cocco and nutmeg plantations everywhere are ruined. In the
nouthern part of the island lava streams
were running with terrific force. Among
other villages completely obliterated was
that of Tokekam, famed for its beauty and
wealth.

The loss of life is something frightful,
but no accurate estimate of it can yet be

escaped with their lives has been most acute. All the food on the island was destroyed, and but for the prompt assistance of the neighboring islands many would have starved. "The whole of the island," says one writer. "is a mass of smoldering ruins. The people who have lived and prospered there have lost all they ever had, and now the only thing for them to do is to leave for another and more favored spot or stay there and die."
