FIGHT WITH A SHARK.

When within striking distance he hit the fish on the head with an oar. The shark did not swim off, as is usual when pursued, but started in to upset Oakley's boat. It did not succeed, and, swimming away a distance from the boat, headed for it. In an effort to strike the shark missed his calculations and landed flat in the bottom of the boat.

Capt. Oakley was struck on the right thigh by a blow from the shark's tail and sent spinning into the water. Assistance arrived, and, after taking Oakley from the water, the men set upon the shark with oars and boat hooks. It now lies on the beach.

GENERAL WOLFE'S SWORD.

A Precious Historical Relic—For Sale in England.

Mr. Henry J. Morgan, of Ottawa, has been informed by Messrs. Southey, Wilkinson & Hodge, 13 Wellington street, Strand, London, England, that the sword carried by General Wolfe at the taking of Quebec is to be sold by auction. One of the owners of this interesting weapon was a citizen of Ottawa, the late Mr. Stewart Derbishire, for many years Queen's printer, and who had previously represented Bytown in the Legislative Assembly of Canada. Mr. Derbishire gave it to Major, afterwards Lieutenant-Colonel Dunn, of the One Hundredth Regiment, on his departure from Canada in 1858. Major Dunn, it will be remembered, was at Balaclava and won the Victoria Cross for bravery, being the "bravest of the brave" among the famous 600. He was a native Canadian. On his death, in 1868, it passed to his brother-in-law, Mr. Thurlow Down, of the War Office, whose son now offers, for private reasons, to dispose of it.

During the London exhibition of 1862, we are informed by an article in Good Words, that the sword was displayed in the Canadian department, "where it was examined by thousands with that tender respect which everything connected with the young hero who fell on the Plains of Abraham ought ever to excite." It was surrounded by a scroll, with an Imperial crown, having the inscription, "Sword of General Wolfe, who fell at Quebec, Sept. 13, 1759." In a letter written to Mr. Morgan, Colonel Dowling, the present possessor, relates that the hilt of the sword, which possesses a three-cornered blade, is of silver.

Already the dealers have received several offers for the purchase of the relic. Among these is one from a well-known New York collector—so that the bright and animating weapon once wielded by the all-conquering arm of the hero of Louisbourg and Quebec stands a chance of finding a resting-place among the curiosities of Barnum's museum. We trust, however, that no such unhappy fate is in store for it; but that following the excellent example of the Marquis of Lorne, with Montgomery's sword, at one time held by a Quebecker, but which through his Lordship's influence, was graciously restored to the people and country of the famous Irish-American, Wolfe's sword, together with the hilt of the equally heroic Montcalm, if in existence, may be acquired by the nation and held for all time.—[Ottawa Citizen.]
